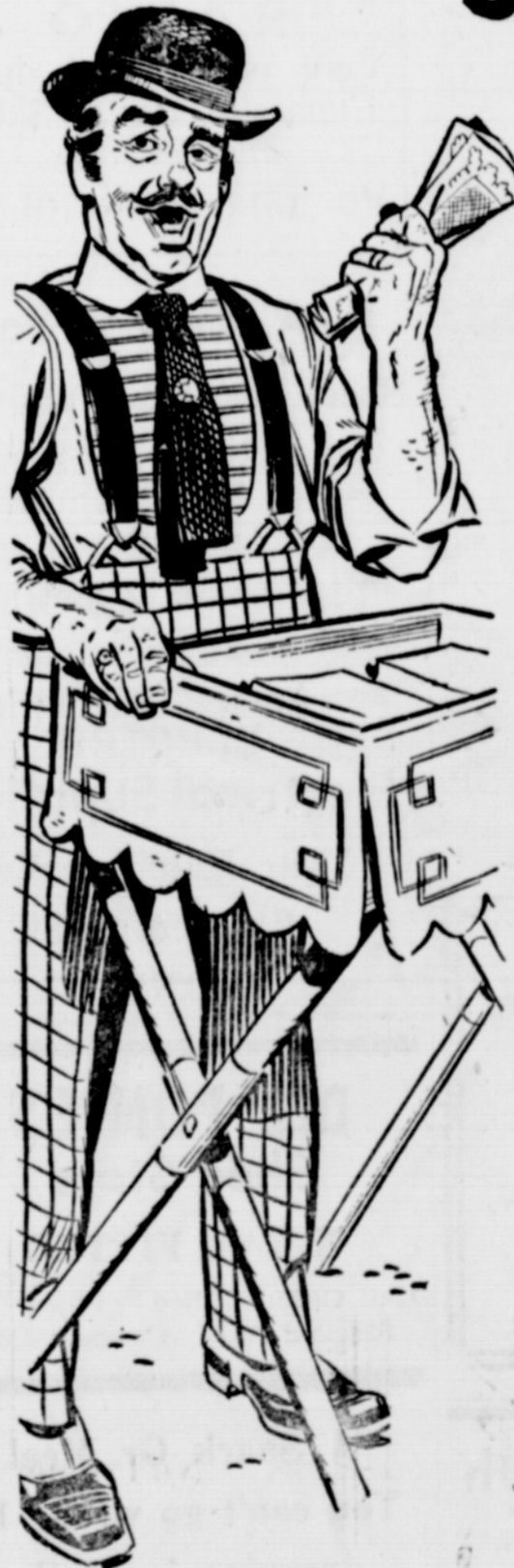
Rains of this week have added to the troubles of the highway construction crew, more than the moisture has hindered lily bulb growers of the area. Sometimes a little rain can "go a long way."
