

Ballots Printed For November Election

Ballots for Curry County were completed Tuesday of this week by Typo-Print of Gold Beach, using the big press at the Pilot, thus enabling those seeking absentee ballots plenty of time before the election day.

Besides carrying the state, county, and Non-Partisan offices, the ballots contain nine referendum measures for the voters to decide this year.

Ballots were printed for 11 precincts of the county: Chetco, Brookings, Pistol River, Gold Beach, Ophir, Port Orford, Sixes, Floras Creek, Agness, Illahe and Mule Creek. Numbers of ballots required, by precincts:
