

Enrollment Up At SOCE, Ashland

ASHLAND—Enrollment at S. O. C. E. for 1950-51 is up three per cent over last year, Mrs. Mabel Winston, registrar, announced last week.

While the increase is not as large as was originally expected, Southern Oregon is the only college in the state with exception of the law and medical schools in Portland to show a substantial increase, according to latest available figures, Mrs. Winston asserted.

Enrollment at the college last year reached 782. On Oct. 10 this year the figure was 805.

All the regular college classes (full-time students) show an increase. Special students (part-time) have decreased. Mrs. Winston also noted an increase in the number of students coming directly from high school to the college. Veteran enrollment has dropped 30 per cent, which is a general and expected trend in all colleges this fall.

An increase in the number of women students and a decrease in men students were also noted by the registrar. In 1949-50 there were 491 men and 291 women enrolled; this year there were 482 men and 323 women.
