

Curry County Cow Sets Two World Milk Records; Almost 12 Tons of Milk Given

Two new world-wide all breed and three Jersey milk and butterfat production marks were written into the dairy record books Oct. 12 by a purebred, eight-year-old Jersey, Opal Crystal Lady, owned by Ralph E. Cope, II, of Langlois, it was announced at Oregon State College, Corvallis.

An official 365-day test supervised by Prof. Floyd B. Wolberg, OSC dairy department staff member, the cow produced 1,237 pounds of butterfat in 23,725 lbs. of milk. Both records have been approved by the American Jersey Cattle club, Columbus, O.

The butterfat figure, 1,237 lbs. is a new all-breed production mark for twice daily milking. It bests by more than 85 pounds the previous two-a-day record set in April this year by a Holstein cow owned by C. J. Berning of Mt. Angel. The former butterfat mark was 1,141.6 pounds.

The new record holder also is the first cow of any breed to complete three consecutive lactations on twice daily milking, producing more than 1,000 lbs. of butterfat during each. Opal's last three lactations include: 1,064, 1,035, and 1,237 pounds of butterfat.

In emphasizing the new record, Wolberg pointed out that the "average" dairy cow in the United States produces 209 lbs. of butterfat in 5,239 pounds of milk.

New Jersey breed marks set include butterfat for both twice and three times daily milking, and a new Jersey milk production mark. The old Jersey milk record, 23,677 pounds, was set by an animal owned by J. T. Carpenter, Bardwell's Ferry, in Massachusetts. The record has stood since 1928.

The former butterfat production mark for the Jersey breed set on a three-times-daily milking schedule was made last year by a cow, Orlland Signal Vol. Sable, owned by the Victory Jersey Farm, Tulia, Texas. This record, 1,223 pounds, was surpassed by 14 pounds by the new Cope record.

Opal Crystal Lady, large by Jersey standards, weighs 1,350 pounds and was born Feb. 6, 1942. The record period began Oct. 13, 1949, and was concluded with the evening milking Oct. 12, this year. The interval between the period end and the announcement was due to the necessity of having the records approved by the college and the

American Jersey Cattle Club.

During the past four years, the Cope herd has made an enviable butterfat production record. For the past test year, 42 cows produced 645 pounds of butterfat, and the herd averaged for the past four years is now 655 pounds of butterfat, being the highest producing herd ever tested for the Jersey breed.

Young Cope, now 24, is a veteran of 10 years of 4-H club work having been enrolled in clubs led by H. S. Cadman, another Langlois Jersey breeder. He was named winner in 1944 of the national 4-H dairy production contest, sponsored by the Kraft Food Co. of Chicago.

The new record holder received the same treatment as the remainder of the herd during the test period, Cope states. She was outdoors every day of the year and was fed alfalfa hay, grass silage and about 20 pounds of grain supplement a day. The Cope pastures are primarily irrigated ladino clover and perennial rye-grass.
