SMITH RIVER

One of the worst wind and rain storms of recent years hit this area over the week-end, and according to old-time residents, nothing like it had happened in 25 years. Telephone and power lines were wrecked. All streams were flooded, overflowing the highway so travel from Smith River to Crescent City was impossible.

Smith River overflowed at the Clarence Westbrook ranch, also flooded the road at the former Rooney home, now occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Martin, who left by boat when the river came up to the top steps. They stayed at the Lester Ulrich home.

At Tryon corner four to five feet of water covered the highway, washing out all fences and strewing driftwood into the barn and barnyard at the Tryon ranch with Mr. Tryon having to go from the barn to the house in a rowboat. Driftwood covers so many of the pastures along the river, and logs dot the landscape in many places.

Construction men building a new bridge across Rowdy creek on the new highway, lost considerable machinery, tools and cement when Rowdy creek went out of its banks. It will take weeks for damages to be repaired on highway, ranches caused

by the storm and resultant slides.
