For as many reasons as names appear on this advertisement, the Pilot is convinced of its merits, and endorses this move.

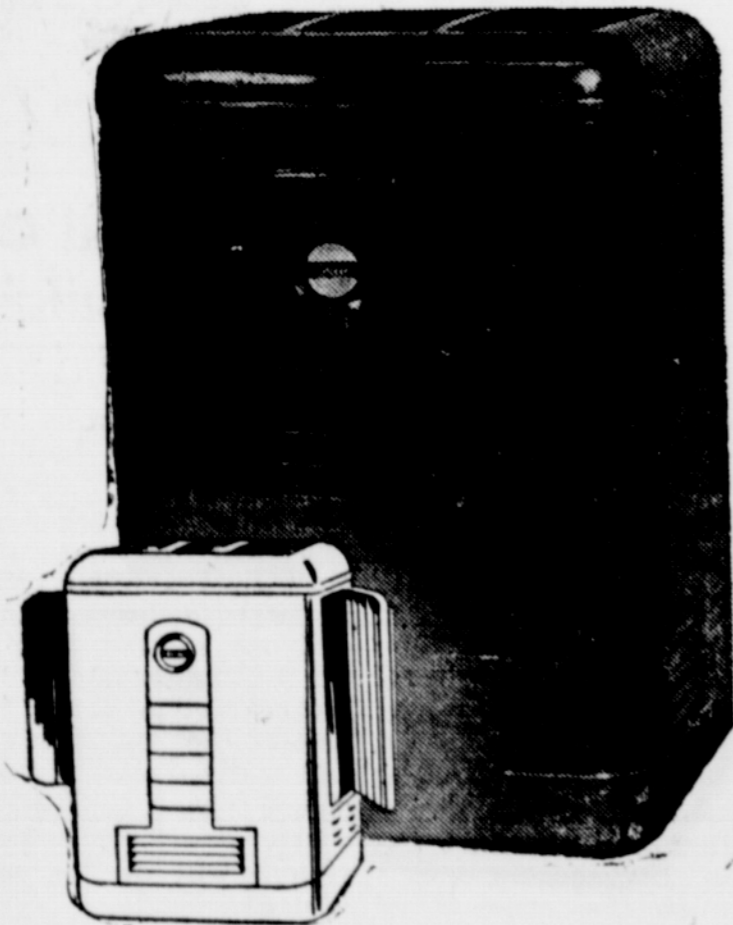
