### In The Mail-box:

Editor, Pilot:

Communism uses the "big lie" technique. It seems to me that certain liquor interests are using this same tactics in connection with their current attack on State Measure 316.

"Don't be tricked into prohibition" they cry. But let's not allow them to trick us into thinking this is a prohibition measure. It is NOT. In fact it doesn't even

prohibit all liquor advertising, as anyone can see who will take a few moments to read "Official Voters' Pamphlet" in connection with this issue.

The real purpose of this measure is stated by the committee which sponsored it in the following words:

"The people of the State of Oregon can control liquor advertising originating within the state, but cannot control advertising originating outside the state. But we, the people of the State of Oregon, have the right to stipulate and to control the conditions under which liquor can be sold in our state. The ONE AND ONLY PURPOSE of this law is to stop all promotive advertising by making unsalable the commodity thus advertised.

"Great care was exercised in drafting this measure. Every possible contingency has been briefed with respect to statutory and constitutional law. This bill will successfully operate under and strengthen the present liquor control laws of our state.

"Many alcoholic beverage ads are built around pets, beautiful animals, athletics, fishing, hunting and family and home scenes. These ads, which are made very attractive, present a strong appeal to the imagination of our youth and tend to cultivate in them the drink habit. This bill will make this type of promotive advertising unprofitable."

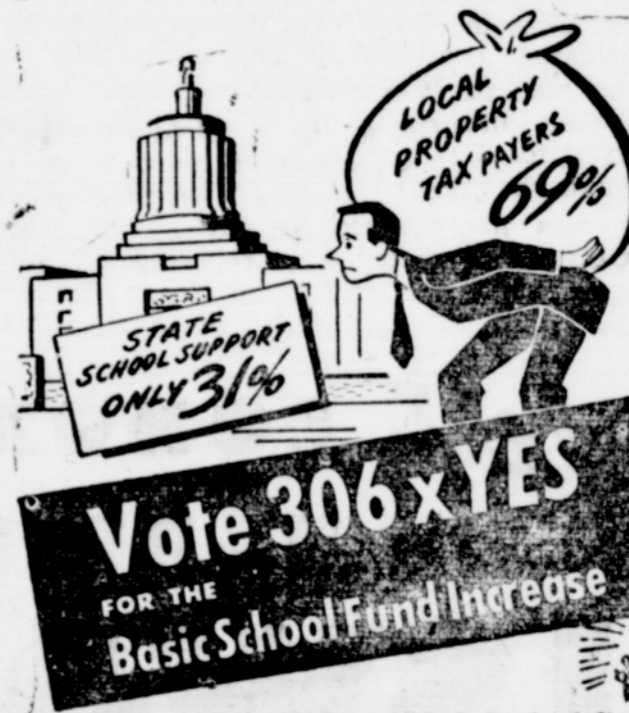
The liquor interests CAN take steps to make sure that such advertising is kept out of Oregon. This of course will be an inconvenience to them. But not as much of an inconvenience as is caused our communities and our state by the habitual users of these alcoholic products who fill our jails, asylums and hospitals to overflowing. Let's not be so tricked by the "big lie" technique into defeating this measure. Let's protect our children from the malicious influence of the misleading liquor ads by voting YES on 316.—Leo VanDolson, Brookings.
