Every woman brings a gift of something she has made or grown, and if she brings a gift to the meetings, she brings a gift for her as well. This, time, she does not reach into the preserve closet for a glass of jelly, since her neighbor probably has plenty of her own. Here she exercises pride and skill and brings of her best, her own peculiar talent. Last year one woman brought a filled coffee cake which as a taste treat and in appearance rivaled anything the Epicures club produced in color illustrations.

I still use the dish cloths my Christmas package contained and have thanked the maker three times, every day for 365 days. Women are so fussy about dish cloths as men are about tools. They must be just the right size, texture and weight. There is value to a gift ex-

change such as this, over and above the friendliness, provided the gifts are home-made or home grown.
