

## 4-H Achievement Break All Records

**GOLD BEACH**—This week is National 4-H club achievement week, and 315 Curry county 3-H club members are joining more than 1,900,000 in the nation to celebrate the event. Curry county club members carried 394 projects this year with the highest number of members being enrolled in health clubs. Graph traces national growth of 4-H club enrollment from less than 100,000 members in 1912 to the present all-time high. Oct. 31 was the close of the current club year.

Top dairymen in Curry County had their start in 4-H clubs when they were nine years of age. This is true of Ralph Cope, Sidney Cadman, Bill Sweet and Norman Nash. These boys have broken world records and have international recognition as a result of their outstanding accomplishments. Sweet and Nash had some Future Farmer experience, but Cope's and Cadman's formal training was limited to the 4-H club program.

The 1951 enrollment is well on its way, according to Dorothy Newton, who has turned in clubs with huge enrollments of both boys and girls. It is likely that this enrollment will exceed all previous years.

Last year one out of three eligible boys and girls were enrolled in some project. Leaders served without pay, giving their time and expense to this worthy activity.

This type of work is considered to be the backbone of democracy. It is filling the gap formerly served by school and home training. Many parents fail to realize the importance and value of this work and this is the limiting factor in expanding the program. Club work must have parental interest, co-operation, and support.

It is the purpose of 4-H club to become better acquainted with its purpose and to bring its qualities to the attention of more parents. It is about the only remaining activity in which young and old can participate and receive benefit.
