It was a shame that only a few of you Pilot readers heard the two foreign students who were here last Thursday for Rotary luncheon and later at the P.-T. A. meeting. These students answered questions concerning the conditions of their native countries of Germany and India. It was heart-warming to get their re-actions concerning America—America's role in the future of the world. These girls were so emphatic and definite in all the statements made.

Anntraut Goeding, of Mainburg, Germany, was forced with her family to flee from the Russian zone after the war end. The account she gave would chill the blood of the average person. The little Miss from India, Ivy Coffey, had no war experience to relate, but she did have ideas concerning the role of America in world peace.

These girls are in America to

observe and learn the American educational methods and such, to return to their native countries to re-organize the schools of the countries and to bring about a better understanding among all nations of the globe. Miss Goeding is a German teacher, and she related something of the difficulties being experienced there. The crowded conditions, brought to pass by the exodus of people out of the Russian zone has brought about conditions unheard of in this country.

Dr. Miller, the Southern Oregon College of Education professor who brought the young ladies here, acted as moderator in the answering of questions. Often the girls might miss the exact meaning of a question and his job was to clear any doubt in their minds, due to language difficulty. People who were privileged to hear these ladies were more than compensated for the effort.

The friendliness of these girls—their unaffected manner, and their willingness to meet and to talk to everyone, made the visit much more enjoyable. They said that they would enjoy another visit when time was not so rushing for them.

While I was listening to these two girls explaining their native lands, I thought how little we Americans know about other peoples, and seem to care. Better we know these people, and they know us, the more likely we are to have understanding.

Boy Killed In Car Plunge, Saturday

Donald, 3, was killed instantly and his mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. John Evitt Jr., are in Seaside hospital, with Mrs. Evitt given little chance to live, as a result of a car plunged of 175 feet into Smith River last Saturday about 3. It is said that Mr. Evitt felt ill, and was in the act of pulling to the side of the road when the accident occurred. It is presumed that his foot hit the gas feed instead of the brake.

The family, comprising the parents, their two sons, Vernon, about 8, and Donald, were returning home about 8:30 from Cave Junction. Vernon, with an arm broken, managed to scale the precipitous bank, attract a motorist, and summon help. The small boy was crushed, the father sustained 11 broken ribs in addition to other possible internal injuries. The mother was hurt internally, and her condition is reported critical.

The lad is survived by his parents, a brother, Vernon, and his grandparents: Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Jackson of Silverton and Mr. and Mrs. John Evitt Sr. of Castle Rock, Wash.
