

4-H Leader Will Compete, Chicago

GOLD BEACH—Competing for national honors, Curry County will be represented by H. S. Cadman, Langlois dairymen and 4-H leader. "Caddie," as the boys and girls call him, has a generation of graduates from his livestock clubs. This fall he completes 16 years of leadership.

Beyond the scope of parental influence, Ralph Cope owes more credit to Cadman for his outstanding success as a Jersey cattle breeder, than perhaps to any other one individual.

Records on file in the county agent's office show 187 projects completed under his guidance. These include three of his own children, Eidney, Teddy and Dorothy, all successful in their own established place of industry.

These records date back to '31 to '35 in Coos county, and continue with interruption in Curry county except from 1945 to 1947, when his health restricted his community activities.

This year for the sixth consecutive year, one man and one woman will receive a trip to the national 4-H congress, Nov. 26 to 30. Cadman is the Curry county entry in the state contest.

The selection is based on the leadership qualities as measured by: the number of years of leadership; the number of projects completed; the winnings of trained teams and exhibits; the per-

formance and accomplishments of members after graduation from his clubs, and other community activities.
