Rev. Hunt of Eugene conducted church services at the Langlois Community church, Sunday.

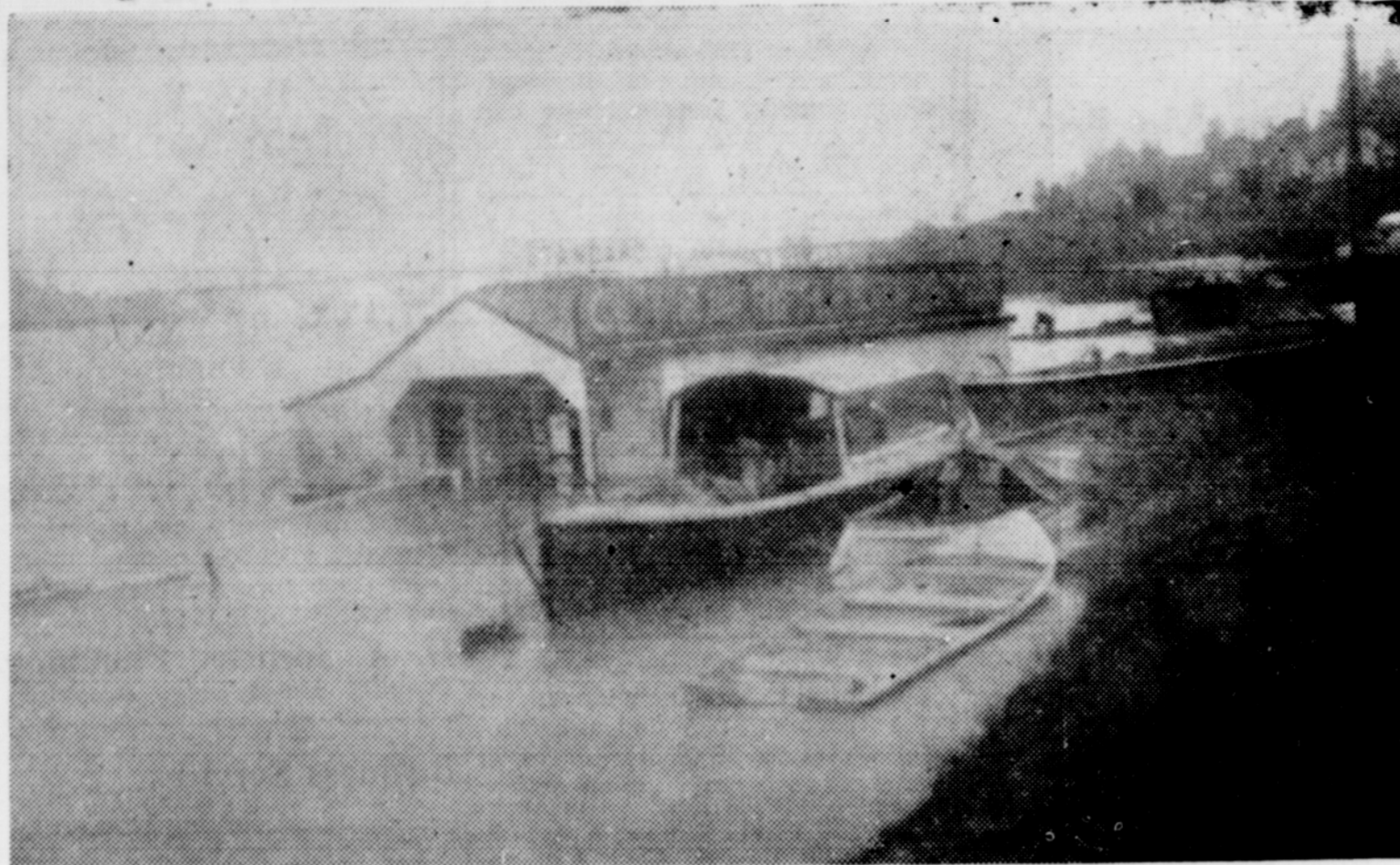
