Mr. and Mrs. Olney and daughter spent Thanksgiving at Tilla-

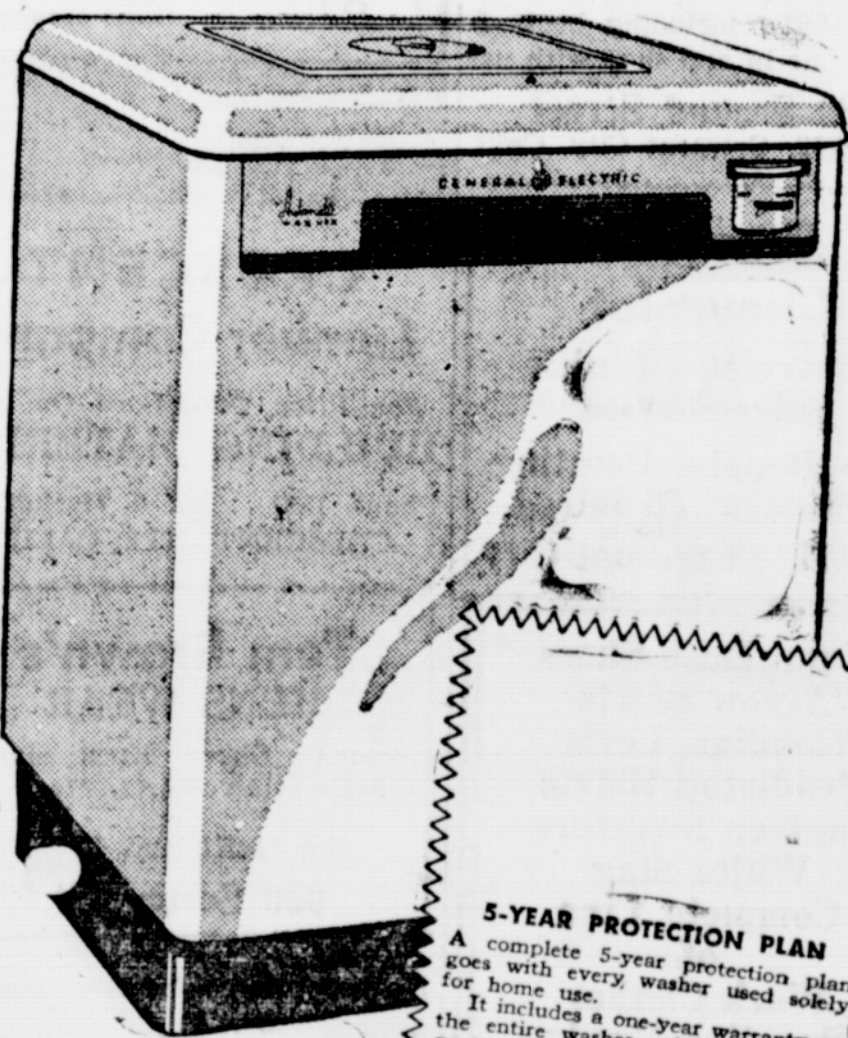
mook with Mrs. Olney's parents. They also visited his sister and friends at Astoria. Mr. Olney is head of the welfare department for Curry County.
