Mr. and Mrs. A. F. Burmeister had as Christmas guests their son and daughter-in-law of Seattle, Wash.

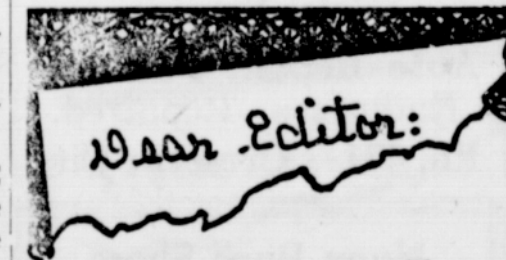

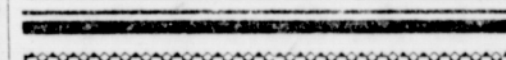

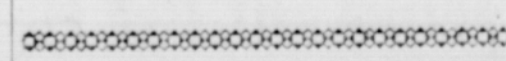

People of the area are reminded that the January P.-T. A. meeting is booked for next Thursday.

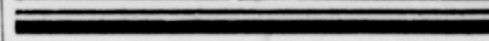
Mrs. Harriett Baker vacationed at San Francisco over the New Year holiday.

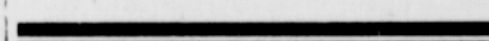
