Sea Phenomena Is Beautiful Sight

Spume was especially beautiful Monday on the beaches near Brookings.

Action of a rough sea causes the dashing of high waves against large rocks to produce a frothing of the water. This froth will build up and up on the beaches until it resembles cumulus clouds observed in the sky when there is disturbances in the air. The phenomena is called *spume*.

One can get an idea what this looks like if he were to put considerable soap in a small amount of water, in a container and agitate with an egg beater. A northwest wind usually produces spume in this area. Water is run into protected area and as it ebbs is hit by another incoming wave, producing a terrific churning, and forming of foam.

Strong winds carry portions of

the froth into the air, casting it about like snowballs from the hands of the youth. Spume was knee- (and waist) deep in some places, Monday.

From a photograph of spume, taken some years ago by Miss Anna Watkins, a teacher here, in possession of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Crissey, the phenomenal ac-
