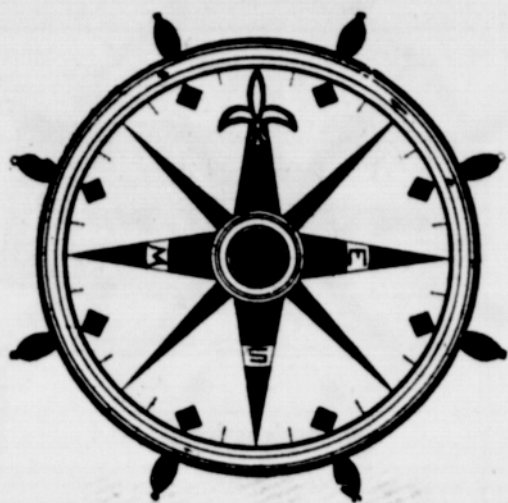
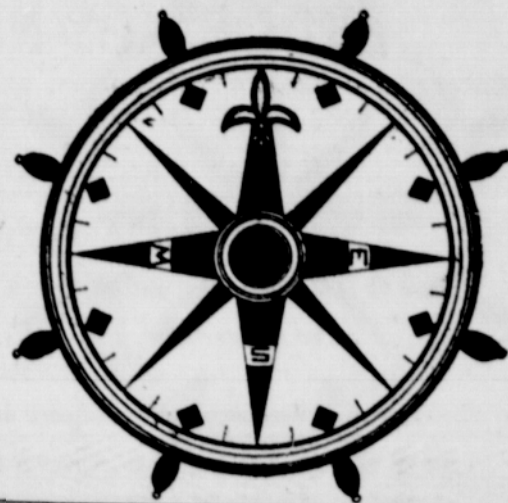

Directors Named To C. Of C. Board Last Thurs. Eve.

Ross Putnam, logging contractor, was named to the three-year term as director of the Brookings chamber of commerce last Thursday evening, Charles Young to the two-year term and A. S. "Tony" Christensen to the one-year term, following election of directors. The election was held over from December meeting, which was postponed because of the holidays.

At a meeting of the directors, Tuesday night, officers for the coming year were named:

President—Elmer Parker.
Vice-President — Roy Weideman.
Treasurer—Charles Young.
Secretary—Mrs. Elmer Parker.

Topic of incorporation of town of Brookings was discussed briefly, with sentiment apparently well-crystallized in its favor. A committee, appointed to obtain all data, will call a public meeting as soon as the committee is ready.

A drive for membership was inaugurated, with some results that evening.

Clive Manley was named head of a committee to ascertain if any naval installations will be forthcoming for this section of the west coast.

Mrs. Goldie Smith, postmaster, reported on the growth of the community as reflected by the increase in postal receipts, and by the increased demand for post office boxes. "Our quarters are already inadequate, that which we believed sufficient when we moved the postoffice in 1948.

The meal was served by members of the Altar Society, with about 75 present.

Proposal Would Limit Income Tax

There is a movement on foot to limit federal income taxes to a maximum rate of 25%, except in time of war. This is being accomplished by a resolution which has been circulated among the various states.

It is for the purpose of compelling congress to be more careful of its recommendations of expenditures. In time of war all the people are agreed that an all-out effort should be made, and expenditure of money is of secondard importance. However, in times of peace, the picture is different. National peace expenditures have increase beyond the boundaries of common sense.

Twenty states have adopted this resolution and it requires the affirmation of but 12 more. Oregon has not adopted this resolution. It will be presented to the Oregon legislature now in session. There is no reason why Oregon should not join with the other states. The legislature is likely to adopt this resolution.

Promised Storm Misses This Area

The "promised storm" hit the west coast as the weather bureau predicted, with the fury of a cage of enraged lions, but the gales of 50 to 80 miles an hour missed this area, fortunately, Sunday night. However, from Arcata south, from radio reports, the storm was not over-exaggerated.

P. G. & E. 110,000 volt power line was out into Eureka and Arcata, throwing much of the area in darkness, and many of the sawmills out of activity until late Monday. Road damage, due to slides, and fallen trees, were reported over both Eureka stations, Sunday night and on Monday.

While the wind blew here, at times pretty strong, it is quite certain to state that never did it reach more than 35 miles an hour. Rain fell in showers, but for the most part, the storm detoured Pelican Bay by many miles to the south.

In a letter to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Kerr, their son, Bob, expressed his appreciation of letters and packages sent to him at Christmas time. After the retreat at Hungnam to Pusan, the boys were feeling pretty low and the four packages and 22 letters he received made it the "most wonderful Christmas he had ever had." Some of his buddies received no mail, or packages, and Bob said it was heart-breaking to witness. He received a package from the VFW as did other boys from this area.

Man Drowned At Port Orford

PORT ORFORD — Francis D. Wariner, recently of Newport, was washed from the rocks at Agate Beach about noon, Jan. 15. He had come to Port Orford a few days earlier from Crescent City with friends, Mr. and Mrs. Allen Bruce. They rented a cabin and intended fishing. The sea was unusually rough after a night of gale winds, and a breaker swept Wariner into the ocean.

Coastguardsmen and local officials were summoned by the Bruces, but pounding seas prevented any attempts to bring the body to the surface. Wariner, about 55, is reported to have two sons at Eureka, and a daughter, elsewhere.

Pyramids History Affected Mankind

Rev. John L. Mumbower, pastor of Baptist Community church, Tuesday told the Rotary club a little of the history of the Pyramids, some 12,000 years ago, of how our present-day engineers still ponder the feat, and of the intricate fitting of the blocks, each of which weighs tons, were moved and piled as they are.

From the building of the Pyramids, comes many of our geometric problems and solutions of today. The building and designing of these edifices have also a prophetic meaning, which, according to the speaker, have been accurate, not to days, but to minutes and seconds in their prophesies.

The tunnels, the archways, and all of the architecture point to the various rises and falls of the many civilizations in the centuries since their erection. The lessons of the Pyramids are still not fully understood by man for evidences point to that great building feat that a greater civilization existed at that time.

Man has strayed so far from the right in the world today, man has become so corrupt in his dealings, man to man, that we know nothing of recent years but wars and rumors of wars.

State Defendant In Civil Lawsuit Filed In Co. Court

SALEM—M. B. (Rex) Hayes, of Harbor, proprietor of Cedar Lane Cannery, has filed a claim against the State of Oregon, the Highway Commission and Parker-Schram, road contractors, in the sum of \$24,913.34.

This claim arises out of road construction work being done on Highway 101 between the Chetco River bridge and the state line.

Hayes alleges and claims that, in the process of making a fill on the highway along his business property, the State of Oregon and its employees and contractors covered up and destroyed the cannery's water supply. In his claim Hayes asks compensation for his expenses, and damages for loss of business and injury to his business Ed F. Ackley of Brookings is representing Mr. Hayes in this action.

Court Cases Heard At Gold Beach, Sat.

GOLD BEACH—At a session of Circuit Court Saturday, the following matters, affecting residents of the Brookings-Harbor area were heard by Judge Dal King:

Dorothy Wilber was granted divorce from John Wilber. Buffington and Shaw was attorneys for plaintiff.

Doris J. Ackley was granted divorce from Donald E. Ackley.

In the case of Albert Landauer versus B. R. Jewell and Thos J. Funari, a motion to set aside judgment was argued. A default in the case had previously been entered against the defendants. Funari argued that since the partnership of Jewell & Funari had been dissolved April 7, 1950, that he was not liable on the judgment.

A motion to amend the complaint in Delmar Colegrove versus F. T. Hatchett, Pistol River sawmill operator, was denied and defendant was ordered to answer the complaint. Colegrove is suing Hatchett and alleges that he delivered logs to the latter's mill and was not paid for them.

In the case of Lawrence W. Johnson versus Milton DeMartin, the court ordered that argument on a demurrer to plaintiff's complaint, be made by briefs. In this case Johnson is suing DeMartin for \$25,000 damages alleging DeMartin caused him to be falsely arrested. According to the complaint DeMartin acted as a private prosecutor. Johnson alleges that DeMartin maliciously prosecuted this action. In the last four cases Ed F. Ackley, Brookings attorney, appeared for the plaintiffs.
