Luther Tisdale will be guest speaker at Azalea Garden Club meeting, Feb. 8. His subject is "organic gardening," which encompasses fertilizers, earthworms, humus. Members and friends welcome the opportunity to learn more of this subject so vital to all horticulturists. Luther Tisdale has studied and practiced organic gardening for some years—and has the ability to make any subject interesting, and this one especially so.

There are not many people who have been in this community as long as Frank Pallady of Harbor. He came here about 36 years ago when the first lumber mills were being erected by Brookings Lumber Co., and the little village of Brookings laid out by Walter Dubois Brookings and his architect friend.

He went up the Chetco River to paint the school house, and found it a very pleasant occupation because of the attractive school marm. This was 22 years ago, and when his wife, Pauline, was teaching there. She boarded at a home on the property now belonging to the Clive Manleys. They were married and have lived here in the community for many years, although not all the time they have been married. They have seen many changes and have interesting stories to tell about them.

Both the Palladys are naturalists and are especially knowing about wild flowers. They share their avocation with garden club members and have increased an appreciation of the beauties of woods, streams and fields, not only by Mrs. Pallady's talks on wild flowers, but also by the specimens and arrangements they bring to meetings.

Mrs. Pallady has prepared a series of programs for the coming months, entitled "Indian Trails." Assisted by members of the club, she will lead us down Indian trails, show us what plants were used for medicine. What the Indians gathered for food and drink. The berries dried for future use. The woods the Indians cut. How they obtained their dye stuffs: What they smoked. Mrs. Pallady will also bring to the garden club meeting as will the others taking part in the program specimens of the flowers which they discuss.

Leading off at the February garden club meeting, Mrs. Pauline Pallady's program will be "Indian Trails over the Hills." Mrs. Katherine Rapraeger will bring "Indian Trails along the Beach" to the members and the friends assembled to hear these fascinating wild flower talks.

There is to be a Valentine plant exchange between club members and friends present at the Feb. 8 meeting.

Under Mrs. Charles Grayshel's leadership, an exhibit of horticulture specimens in redwood boxes and hanging baskets, will be displayed. Redwood containers occupy increasing interest because of the decorative value and the ease with which flowering plants are moved about from place to place where color is needed in the home and garden.

Mrs. Ray Struebing will speak briefly on commercial daffodils.
