"I believe the story of J. C. Penney, who built his great big chain. He started in a small town in Wyoming, spread until his chain is second only to Montgomery Ward and Sears & Roebuck."

To carry out his test on what each individual Rotarian felt was the purpose of Rotary, Mr. Kessler came up with many ideas on slips of paper passed among the members. He emphasized, after reading the slips, that vocational service, in his opinion, one of the greatest points of Rotary service.
