Using a basketball to represent the earth, and a Japanese

float to represent the sun, he illustrated the earth's movement about the sun, and on its own axis to show how heating of the earth surface caused mass-movement of air, and of the waters in the ocean as well.

While claiming no specific scientific knowledge, it is surprising how true to Form N of the Weather Bureau he talked about all movements of air and water, except that he did not explain all these conditions in terms of high and low pressure areas, cold fronts, thermals, etc.
