Luther Tisdale's informative talk on Organic Gardening at Azalea Garden Club meeting on

Thursday, was a garden club program intelligently bringing the audience some constructive ideas on a basic problem for horticulturists. Tisdale has for years practiced organic gardening which is the scientific use of natural products to enrich and protect the plant life, as opposed to artificial fertilizers and sprays. He imported special earthworms which breed fast, and work in through the soil and composted materials turning them to humus. He brought with him a sample of the humus, and some of the worms. He gave careful directions on the proper way to make a compost pile. Considerable interest was evinced in the subject, as demonstrated by the unusual number of guests attending the meeting, as well as

questions asked Mr. Tisdale during the question period.

Mrs. Pauline Pallady and Mrs. Katherine Rapraeger's talks on wild plants used by the Indians were enjoyed by all. Garden club members have found Mrs. Pallady's programs on wild flowers so helpful.
