A quart for every child and a pint for every adult every day is the amount of milk the U. S. Department of Agriculture recommends for the American people to drink and keep in good health. If every child drank that much milk there would not be need for concern about amount of soda pop he consumed for the small child would not be able to hold much other liquid. The division of Home Extension also recommends that children be asked to drink their milk in the home before starting on the so-called soft drinks.

If your small child drinks more than a quart a day it might be wise to examine on analyze the amount of other types of food he eats during the day. Some children do not get enough calories for energy in starches and sugars or regulatory foods in fruits and vegetables if the stomach is first filled with milk.

Methods for increasing the amount of milk taken are many. It can be combined with many foods in cooking or the drink itself may be dressed up by the addition of other foods. Next week some ideas of this sort.
