Here's a tip for homemakers in making that food dollar stretch in a period of rising prices:

Purchase foods that are comparatively low in price yet highly nutritious. For instance, there is just as much nutritive value in the less demanded cuts of meat that sell for lower prices, as in the higher priced cuts.

Examples are short ribs and chuck pot roasts. Brisket is economical for making soup, for in addition to the soup-stock, it is more meaty than the average soup bone.

The homemaker also should be on the lookout for foods that are most plentiful during any given month and presumably should cost less.

During the month of February, the Department of Agriculture tells us there will be plenty of apples, oranges and grapefruit, as well as potatoes, onions and sauerkraut.

In the protein line there will be plentiful supplies of eggs, frozen fish, shrimp and cottage cheese, and in many sections poultry (broilers, fryers and heavy turkeys). And the children can count on lots of peanut butter and honey.

Your independent grocer and meat retailer can be your budget's best friends if you'll just consult them. They'll gladly tell you what foods are most plentiful during the current month and point out what foods are less costly.

You'll also be surprised how very helpful the grocer can be in furnishing information about the proper and most appetizing preparation of foods. Many a tasty, wholesome and economic recipe has been passed on to a homemaker by the men who know their groceries and meats best.
