That Snoopy Home-Maker

Trying To Feed Her Hungry Brood

THIS COLUMN is taking a little different form this week to give the readers a change. It is the desire of THE SNOOPY HOME-MAKER that this page will be of help to wives and mothers in planning for and preparing lunches for their husbands and children in school. If you find it helpful, you might wish to tape this column to the inside of the cupboard door to refer to from time to time.

Workmen & School Lunches (packed)

1. LUNCHES IN GENERAL—

A. The lunch must serve the purpose—

1. Man doing heavy physical labor naturally must have a larger lunch than the first grade girl, but all must include:

- A form of carbohydrate as bread for energy;
- A protein, as meat or substitute, for re-building tissue torn down by the body by exercise, and building new tissue in growing children.

1. Faster the growth the more calories needed.

2. Harder the work, the more calories needed.

B. SANDWICHES, naturally the main part of the lunch)

1. BREAD:

a. Vary the kind of bread from day to day—

1. From 10 to 15 kinds of bread are at Williamson's Bakery and at your favorite food market.

a. Occasionally make nutbread, fruitbread or brown with baking powder at home.

b. You might even enjoy making home-made yeast bread occasionally—if so, fine.

b. Choose good bread for the family—

1. Fresh but not gummy, makes best sandwiches;

2. Bread that is substantial;

a. Stays with one longer.

b. Is HEALTHFUL.

c. Requires more and longer chewing, which is good for the teeth.

2. FILLINGS FOR SANDWICHES—

If fillings will keep, make enough at one time for a number of days and place in jars in the refrigerator for future use.

- Meat, egg, fish, cheese and peanut butter.
- Lunch meats, many kinds are found at M. & H. Market at Redfields, Dimmick's meat department or at Hanscans.
- Combination of any in (a) with chopped celery, pickle, or ever cabbage—

1. In combining fish and celery, chop the celery and pickle until fine and add salad dressing.

2. Try crisp finely chopped cabbage with shredded salmon, a small amount of lemon juice and salad dressing.

d. Cheese, nut and raisin sandwich filling.

1. Grind American cheese with other ingredients and moisten with mayonnaise or cream.

e. Sweet Sandwich Fillings—

1. Peanut butter and jelly or honey.

2. Jam, or jelly alone.

f. Minced Deviled Egg Sandwiches—

1. Mash a number of hard-cooked eggs with pastry mixer or potato masher and add ingredients as you would in deviled eggs.

3. BROOKINGS HARBOR SPECIAL—

1. Spread Williamson's Bread with Seaview Dairy Butter, and add this filling prepared from meat, eggs and salad dressing purchased from Hanscam's, Brookings Market or Redfield's.

a. Put minced ham or bologna and hard-cooked eggs through the food chopper, add seasonings desired and moisten with salad dressing.

1. If egg is wanted most in the diet add a greater amount of this product.

2. If the meat flavor is desired, add the greater amount of bologna.

3. Lettuce is an addition to most any sandwich and especially the Brookings-Harbor special.

4. Some Form of Beverage or Hot Soup—

a. Lunches are not as likely to become tiresome if kinds of bread and fillings are varied from day to day.

1. Cheese, peanut butter and sliced lunch meat are wonderful standbys but if depended upon day after day they become tiresome and perhaps to the "no like" degree.

b. Other foods to add variety:

1. Raw foods as celery, carrots, radishes, tomatoes, turnips, califlower and onions.

a. In fillings, the use of parsley was omitted.

1. Good for flavor, 2. good because of high iron and vitamin content. (Send along a twinetts salt and pepper shaker, 25c at Chetco Home and Auto Supply Co.

2. Other foods to add variety

a. Long keeping salads, as macaroni, celery, egg and sweet pickle, in small plastic cups, or jars, or dixie cups for sack lunch.

b. Pickles, olives, deviled or hard-cooked egg.

c. Crackers or potato chips, number of sandwiches decreased and other filling foods added.

d. Nuts, salted or in shell.

5. SOME FORM OF SWEET—

a. Thermos bottles are wonderful for keeping this food hot in cold weather and cold drinks cool in summer.
