

Seek Memberships For Concert Assn.

CRESCENT CITY—That 1951-1952 memberships in the Del Norte Community Concert Association are now available by mail and will be available during the official drive during March 5 to 10, has been announced by Carl Kruger, who recently was appointed president by the board of directors to fill out the term of Ruth Phillips.

Among the big problems to come before Congress this session will be:

1. Shall we send ground force troops to Europe? (The president seems to take the position that congressional approval is not necessary for that decision but there will be votes in congress bearing directly upon the point—possibly in connection with appropriations).

2. Shall 18-year-old boys be drafted?

3. How big and what sort of tax bill will be enacted?

4. The president has dared congress to cut his 71 billion-dollar budget—will congress cut it?

There will be many other hotly-debated questions but these, at least, are in view now.

Members of congress are receiving quite a few letters and telegrams from irate citizens demanding the impeachment of the president. I have received a sizeable number of such communications. These are troublous times and it is small wonder that people want to remove from office those who are deemed to be blamed for our troubles.

But under our system the passage by the house of representatives of a bill of impeachment is practically equivalent of making a criminal indictment. Impeachment is much more than merely an expression of disapproval.

Lack of ability, incompetence or stupidity are not crimes. The voters had more than three years in which to consider Mr. Truman's qualifications as president before they elected him in 1948. If they have now changed their minds about him they must wait until 1952 before they can remove him and his cronies.

In a piece by one of the big-name gossip columnists whose daily effort is printed in numerous cities throughout the country, appeared this gem of a sentence recently: "Since the start

of the conflict in Korea, which is neither wholly war nor wholly peace, things have been decidedly abnormal."

Let him try to make the fellows in Korea believe they are not "wholly at war." It has been a mystery to me for years why so many otherwise intelligent newspaper publishers pay big money to some of these columnists for writing such drivel.

Lenin is supposed to have said: "We shall destroy the free market system by printing so many bonds and so much money that the capitalists will choke on 'em." If he were on earth now he certainly would get a chuckle over the fact that he did not even have to go to the trouble of doing the printing.

It is difficult, I find, to keep from becoming both cynical and a little bitter about the operation of the executive department of our government (including the state department). The congress can only make the law, raise the taxes, appropriate the money and sometimes make investigations. Vital, sweeping—sometime world shaking—decisions are made in the name of the president. Then congress can only discuss them, which surely does not do much good.

To end this letter on a slightly brighter note, however, calm and objective appraisal indicates things are not quite as bad as they seem. In our country we have great power, fine courage and a wonderful spirit. We can, as we have, win through difficulties even against great odds.

Overseas and throughout the world the fear of the Kremlin is growing. The peoples and the governments of the free world are slowly but surely uniting with us in opposition to further aggression by the rules of the Red horde. They are slowly but surely preparing to resist this aggression with force, if necessary. We can hope, therefore, that before too long there can be a balance of power between the Kremlin and the free world. When it becomes too costly and too dangerous for the Soviet dictators to pursue their dream of world control, we will have peace—but not before.

Along Azalea Row

According to the advertisement it was just what they wanted. It stated there was even a family orchard and a good house on the land. They were eager to settle in Oregon and this seemed to be the opportunity they had been waiting for.

But the father could not go. It was June and he would have to harvest the crops and dispose of the property near Fort Collins. It was decided that the mother should go, and that she must leave at once for it would be cold weather by the time she reached her destination.

And so the courageous woman and her five children set out by a covered wagon drawn by horses. Her oldest son was 20 and the youngest child was barely school age.

Six months later, on Dec. 6, 1887, the little family arrived in what is now Harbor, Oregon.

Here they were obliged to leave the wagon behind and proceed to their destination on horseback. When they reached the property they had purchased near Pistol River, they found only some poor lean-tos, and sheds, used for the sheep. And the orchard consisted of a few straggly trees.

Enid Clark Hurst's mother was the youngest of the five children to make that long journey from Fort Collins, Colo., to Oregon some 63 years ago. Mrs. Hurst is herself a pioneer of Brookings. As a wee child she played about the village while her father assisted Mr. Ward to lay out the streets of our town. And the family lived in the house which is now occupied by Mrs. Mildred Byrne.

Enid Hurst continued to live in Brookings through the busy years from 1913 on. Many times she saw the large schooners lying off-shore, loading lumber. Our lovely little bay with its tree-clad mountains was not then generally known as Pelican Bay. It is now so indicated on the coast and geodetic survey maps and is very appropriately named as the

coastal residents can attest who see the big birds flying about especially during the summer.

Drawn back to Brookings as others who have left here, I asked Enid Hurst if she expected to stay this time. She replied that she and her husband have had faith enough in the future of the community to open a business here. That is certainly positive proof of their convictions.

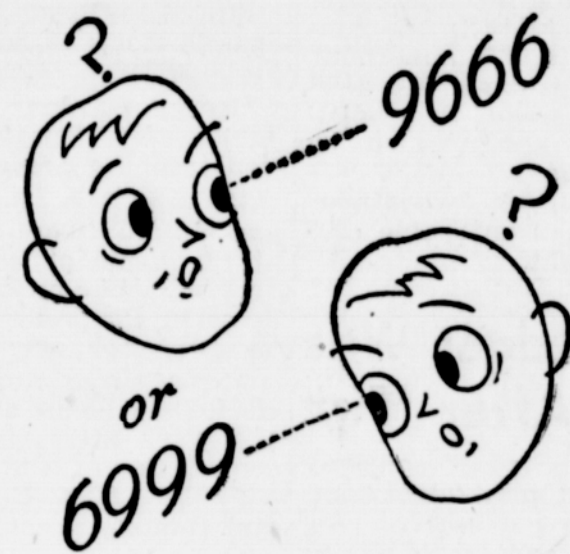
