

Trapp Family Will Conclude Concert Series, March 5th

The old adage about the prophet not without honor save in his own land had impressive contradiction only recently in Salzburg, Austria, when the members of the world-famed singing Trapp Family, who will be heard in concert at the Third Del Norte Community Concert program at the Crescent-Elk auditorium, on Tuesday evening, March 5, at 8:30 p. m., returned for the first time in 12 years to their native land, when they had fled as voluntary exiles from the Nazis directly after the Anschluss.

Appearing for the first time within the framework of the framework of the great international Salzburg Music Festival last summer, during the course of a four-month tour of ten European countries, the Austrian-born singing family, (who now make their home at Stowe, Vt. and all are American citizens) scored such an overwhelming success in their initial performance at the Mozartum Concert hall that they were obliged to give a second concert there and a third Salzburg performance which, to accommodate the clamoring audiences, was arranged outdoors in the historic Cathedral Square, on the stage traditionally reserved exclusively for the annual presentation of the "Everyman" Miracle Pageant.

Everywhere throughout Austria as the Trapps made their way from Paris to Salzburg, welcoming delegations were at hand at train stops to present the nine singers and their priest-conductor, Father Franz Wasner, with floral tributes, and when they disembarked at the Salzburg railroad station they were greeted by a welcoming throng of more than 1000 citizens of Salzburg and visitors to the famed international Music Festival.

During their recent month's stay in the Tyrolean music center the Trapps were quartered at St. Joseph's Seminary at Aigen-bei-Salzburg, formerly their own baronial villa. This mansion and the vast surrounding estate, was confiscated by the Nazis after the Trapps' flight and served as Austrian headquarters throughout the war for Heinrich Himmler's Storm Troopers. Whenever Hitler visited Austria he was in



residence at the Villa Trapp and direct cable and telephone lines connected it with Munich and Berchtesgaden. After the war, the property was restored by the U. S. government to the Trapp family, who deeded it to the religious order of Fathers of the Precious Blood.

Previous to their return to Europe last summer the Trapps had filled a three-month tour of the South and Central America, during the course of which they gave 61 sold out performances throughout Argentina, Brazil, Peru, Colombia, Chile, Venezuela, Guatemala, Mexico, Puerto Rico, Trinidad and Panama. Highlights of their Latin-American tour included three sold-out appearances at the famed Teatro Colon in Buenos Aires (one of the six largest opera houses in the entire world), the final one climaxed by a ten-minute shouting and stamping ovation. Two sold-out performances at the Teatro Municipal in Rio de Janeiro, attended by U. S. Ambassador to Brazil Herschel V. Johnson and Austrian Minister Adrian Rotter, elicited such enthusiasm from the press and public that the singers were obliged to stay in Brazil three weeks longer than they had anticipated, giving 20 concerts, at the rate of three a week, in the south and interior of the country and doing three special broadcasts for the Brazilian government.

At the conclusion of their current U. S. tour, the singing family will leave, in the spring, for a heavily-booked tour of Australia and New Zealand, thus, com-

pleting a full circuit of the globe in a 12-months span.

Gov. McKay Urges Support Of Drive

SALEM—Gov. Douglas McKay has urged the public to support the annual Easter Seal sale of the Oregon Society for Crippled Children and Adults, stating that the purchase of Easter Seals "is an investment in a happy, stable future for many of our neighbors less fortunate than ourselves."

The Easter Seal sale will continue through Easter Sunday, on March 25. An estimated 5000,000 Oregon residents will receive the seals in the mail shortly.

"Funds from Easter Seals provide 10,000 crippled children in Oregon a better opportunity to become self-sufficient participants in the normal activities of their communities," the governor asserted.

Oregon's chief executive pointed out that proceeds from the sale of Easter Seals finance such projects as the hospital school for crippled children at Eugene, the Craft Shop of the Handicapped at Portland and summer recreation camps for crippled children.

"In fact," the governor said, "Easter Seal proceeds help all children, all handicapped Oregonians, both young and old, who are unable to obtain needed assistance from other agencies."
