

Drunk Killed, Sun. At Rivers End Home

SMITH RIVER—Mrs. Ethel Lopez, 27, is confined to the Del Norte county jail for the fatal shooting of Willie White, 40, at the Indian Reservation Sunday, about noon. White, in company with Raleigh Grimes, demanded entrance to her home.

According to Mrs. Lopez' story she was home with her three children. When these two men came to the home intoxicated, Grimes, an elderly Indian, said he was cold and wanted to come in. Mrs. Lopez permitted him to enter but refused to let White inside. White entered anyway.

Once inside the men got into an argument over some money Grimes had. Fearing trouble for herself and children, she told this reporter she grabbed a .22 rifle from the wall and shot once at White's feet. She then fired the second shot which caused instant death.

Mrs. Lopez then ran out of the house and reported the shooting. Sheriff Glover was called, as was Roeder's ambulance. Mrs. Lopez was taken to Del Norte County jail where an inquest was held.

Funeral services were held on Wednesday, Feb. 28.

Your support of House Bill 411 is urged, as the bill provides the enabling legislation under which progress toward an Oregon Botanical Garden will be placed on a practical basis.

Letters from interested persons to their senator or representative asking them to pass H. B. 411 will be helpful.

While writing your representatives concerning H. B. 411 indicate as well as your interest in the desirability of some billboard control legislation. Fortunately, we here in Curry county are not as yet over-run with undesirable billboards cluttering up our scenic roads. Most of our local merchants realize that our scenery is an asset to the tourist trade, and they advertise in the local paper. But an expression of public opinion is needed before the billboards of out of town merchants move in and take over our priceless scenery.

That SNOOPY Home-maker

Feb. 15, a promise was given for some suggestions to increase milk in the diet for children especially. The drink itself may be dressed up by the addition of other foods. For instance, banana milk is interesting to most children. It might be called banana float if that name would be more appealing or intriguing.

Method for Preparing Banana Milk: Mash one ripe banana with a fork, add milk gradually, and sweeten slightly if more desirable, and add a small amount of additional flavoring in form of vanilla or a sprinkling of nutmeg. One banana may be stretched to furnish drinks for a number of tall glasses by the addition of a scoop of ice cream to each serving and topped with a maraschino cherry, or pineapple syrup it becomes party fare.

Hot and cold drinks of all kinds may be made with the addition of commercially prepared foods as chocolate malted milk. Ovaltine added to hot or cold milk makes a nutritious drink high in iron, vitamins A, B1, C and D, besides a good supply of riboflavin. Plain malt, which can be purchased in various brands, can be flavored in numerous ways. When added to milk this eliminating the possibility of becoming tired of chocolate flavor.
