

Available For Use 'Power Pictures'

Completion of "Highline", a color motion picture of the Columbia river power system, was E. Trommershausen, southwest-announced early this week by W. ern district manager, Bonneville Power Administration. A 16mm sound-print of the film will be available for showing to clubs, schools and other groups on application to the district office at P. O. Box 1296, Eugene, Ore.

The one-reel motion picture discusses many of the problems involved in bringing hydro-electric power from federal projects to communities throughout the northwest. The film presents in detail the various phases of line construction and the basic principles of sub-station operation.

"Highline" also shows the benefits derived from integrated operation of up-stream dams, like the Hungry Horse project in Montana, with down-river power.
