Americans Fighting in Korea Get Much-Needed Writing Kits

Korean areas suffering from a shortage of stationery supplies found a friend in one of the world's largest brewing companies. Stationery portfolios, like the one pictured here, are now being distributed by Special Services of the Army to all Air Force, Navy, Marine and Army personnel in Korea. Servicemen listed writing paper as one of their top needs.

Archibald S. Alexander, under-secretary of the Army expressed "deep appreciation on behalf of our servicemen in Korea," in his letter of acceptance to Harris Perlstein, president of the Pabst Brewing company. Front cover of the portfolio contains the reminder "Don't Forget To Write Home." The kits serve a double purpose in supplying writing paper to men who had little or no paper for their letters. It will enable them to write home oftener, assuring parents and relatives of more frequent contact with our forces in the Far East. Returning veterans of the Korean conflict stress mail to and from home as the most potent morale booster to the nation's fighting men.
