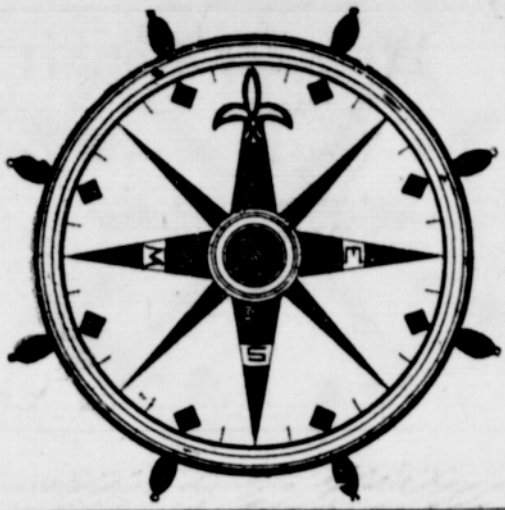
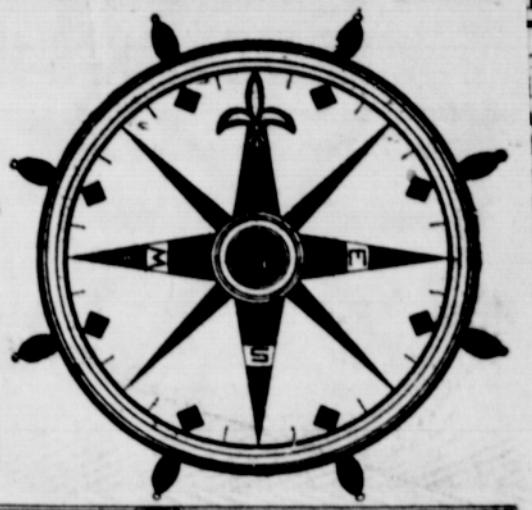

Four Concerts Will Be Given In '51-'52 C. C. A. Season

CRESCENT CITY—As a result of last week's drive, Community Concert will bring its season membership holders four concerts for the 1951-52 series. The choice of concerts was made at a meeting with local drive workers and board members with Robert Stafford, Community Concert representative from New York City.

Two concerts are planned for the fall and two for the spring. Final dates will be announced when the membership cards are sent out following the arrangement of booking dates in the New York office.

The local series for next year will feature the following artists: Menahem Pressler, pianist, called by American critics the "poet" of the piano. In three tours of this country he has played three engagements with the Philadelphia Orchestra, as well as with the Indianapolis and New York Philharmonic-Symphony.

Mary Van Kirk, contralto, winner of the Metropolitan Auditions of the air. She was recently honored by being the first guest soloist televised on radio's "Voice of Firestone."

Columbian Canadian Trio: 3 brilliant young artists, Joan Rowland, pianist; Betty-Jean Hagen, violinist; and William Hossack, celloist. They will offer an evening of sterling musical worth with programs of trios, duos and solos scored for their instruments.

Michael Rhodes, baritone, husky, 6-2, 26-year-old singer who has returned to his career following three years in the army. Last year, he was soloist with Stokowski and the New York Philharmonic-Symphony as well as doing concert performances with Mitropoulos.

The concerts will all be held at the Crescent-Elk grammar school. Memberships are now closed in the association and any single-admission tickets will not be sold at any of the concerts.

Bruins Lost Out At District Tourney

Whether it was the flu which hit the team before going to Yoncolla, or the mammoth floor where the games were played, or a little of both, Brookings Hi Bruins got exactly nowhere in the district tournament.

Friday evening, in the first game against Oakland, the Bruins really made a game of it for the first three quarters, but drew not one point in the last quarter and consequently a loss.

Oakland led at the quarter, 15 to 13; the Bruins forged ahead 25 to 23 at the half, Oakland still was behind 36 to 35 at the third quarter. Then came curtains as far as the Bruins were concerned. The game ended 44 to 36.

Not fully recovered from the illness, coupled with the fact no great honor was then in sight, the Bruins played their worst game of the season, Saturday, losing to Elkton 65 to 40.

It seemed the Bruins never were in this game, behind 21 to 8 at the quarter; 31 to 23 at the half; 51 to 37 at the third quarter; and 65 to 40 at the final whistle.

Survey For Plywood Plant Made Last Week On Mill-Pond; 8 Months To Finish

Surveying and ground-breaking for the new Brookings Plywood Corporation plant began last Thursday when Carl Mason, engineer and architect, and Noble Ellison, one of the incorporators staked out the property, on the south end of the old mill pond.

The plant is expected to be completed by New Years, and in full production within a month thereafter, Mr. Mason told the Pilot, Saturday. "Of course there must be some luck involved, such as good weather and no delays of any kind on shipment of some materials."

The plant, when completed, will be 235x400 feet in size, and will house a complete plywood plant, not a "peeler plant," as many have been led to believe. When in operation, the plant will employ about 250 men, not including men in other operations, such as timber, etc.

Coming of the plywood plant will bring into this area more than 250 families, with an estimated school population increase of at least 400 children. In commenting on this phase, Mr. Mason told the Pilot that most of the stockholders and key men of the organization were of such age that many of their children will be numbered in the high school census. An accurate figure will be compiled for presentation to the local school board and to the rural school board.

F. O. E. Sign 29 In Organization Of A Local 'Aerie'

A total of 29 people have signed applications up to date to become carter members of a new Aerie of the Fraternal Order of Eagles which is being formed in Brookings, according to a statement made last Saturday by David Crawford, and Les Tithcott, organizers who are in charge of obtaining the charter list.

Only 31 more applications are needed before the Aerie will be instituted, the organizers said, another meeting and dance will be held again this Friday night at the VFW hall. Applications are being reported daily.

It is understood that the local VFW hall has been engaged as regular meeting place for the aerie, once organized. Anyone interested in becoming an Eagle is invited to come, Friday.

"One of the main features of the Eagles organization," said Mr. Crawford, "is the benefit plan—a death benefit is paid to qualified members in good standing. A portion of each month's dues is put aside in a special fund for this purpose. It is the cheapest insurance a man can buy."

"Eagles also stress the social side of their activities. Every Aerie maintains a permanent home, to which all Eagles are Welcome. Thus, those members who are away from home always have a place to go where they know they will be welcome and will have companionship."

PORT ORFORD—Neil Knapp, of this place, will be one of Curry county's delegates to the annual 4-H club summer school in June. Neil had the best livestock breeding project in the county last year and is being awarded the scholarship by the sponsor, Safeway Stores. Neil's 4-H club projects include poultry, dairy, health and beef.

He first enrolled in 1948, carrying a 4-H health project, according to Clifford Jenkins, county agent. Last year he was high point man in the 4-H livestock judging at Oregon State Fair. He also was on the Curry county judging team which placed second in competition with judging teams from 27 other Oregon counties.

Incorporation Procedure, Benefits Will Be Explained At "Chamber" Meeting

All the "whys" and "wherefores" of incorporating a city will be explained Thursday (tonight) at the chamber of commerce meeting, when either Herman Kehrle or Arnold Westling, of the bureau of municipal research, of the League of Oregon Cities, and members of the faculty of the University of Oregon will be present to outline a program, and answer questions concerning the proposed incorporation of Brookings.

A committee, appointed by the chamber of commerce to study incorporation, turned its findings over to the board of directors of the chamber last week at a directors' meeting, with recommendations that a citizens committee be appointed after Thursday's meeting, to further bring the topic before the people.

Being a dinner meeting need not bar people, it was pointed out by the chamber officials. Everyone in the area is invited to come, to be heard, and ask questions of the speaker for the evening.
