

Rotary Convention Coming April 8-10

EUGENE—Final plans for a convention of Rotarians from Oregon and southwestern Washington, to be held here April 8, 9 and 10, were announced this week by District Governor Joe Breckel of Vancouver, Wash. The convention will involve 40 clubs in the two states, including several from Brookings.

Principal speakers for the three day affair, which is expected to attract nearly 600 Rotarians and their wives, will be U. S. Senator Wayne L. Morse, and Harold T. Thomas of Auckland, New Zealand, a representative of Rotary International. Morse, who will come here especially for the convention, will discuss some implications of the nation's foreign policy and will hit hard at the isolationists of the country.

Other speakers will include Rabbi Julius Nodel of the Temple Beth Israel at Portland, Dean Eldon L. Johnson of the College of Liberal Arts at the University and President Newburn; President Edward Clark of Multnomah College, Portland and Olin D. Sharp, regional executive of the Boy Scouts.

Of special interest to Rotary wives who attend the convention will be a preview of the Broadway stage hit, "Finian's Rainbow," to be presented by the University Theatre. A style show by Eugene merchants and featuring the latest in fashions from New York and Hollywood, also is scheduled.

The meeting will be held in the new Erb Memorial building on the University Campus.

Enlistments Open In Air Force Mar. 15

Beginning March 15, enlistments will be accepted by the Coos Bay U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force recruiting station for a special all-bay and coastal area regular army platoon. The platoon will be strictly volunteer and enlistees will leave the Coos Bay recruiting office in a group. Those found qualified will be enlisted and forwarded as a group platoon to the training center. Thirty men from the bay and coastal area will be qualified to form this special platoon. Volunteers must be between 17 and 34 year of age with no dependants and meet regular army enlistment standards. The group will be forwarded from the Coos Bay station on April 14 for group enlistment on April 15.

This will be an opportunity for young men to volunteer as group and to be one of the "first for the all-bay coastal area special regular army volunteer platoon. All volunteers found qualified and acceptable will be eligible for special army technical schools in the various arms of the regular army they may qualify, including army officer candidate school if they

can meet the required standards.

Young men desiring to volunteer for this special group are asked to call at the recruiting station in the post office building as Coos Bay to be placed on the volunteer list in order in which they apply. A special numerical block of serial numbers will be obtained and assigned to each individual in order of his enlistment.

Growers Received Good Daffodil Price

Eighteen local growers who shipped their daffodil blossoms through the Brookings Flower Growers, completed their first year of marketing their blossoms through one organization—a total of 1,150,000 blooms were shipped by air freight to the east coast as well as the midwest.

Air freight shipments included 50,000 to New York City, 100,000 to Cleveland, Ohio, 50,000 to Chicago, Minneapolis, Denver, and Montana cities were some of the areas contacted this year. Coast cities of San Francisco, Portland, Tacoma, Seattle and Spokane purchased a large number through local co-operation this year, the price will average out higher than previous years, all of which will be revealed at a meeting billed soon, when growers will decide on steps to carry out next year, reports Charles Grayshel
