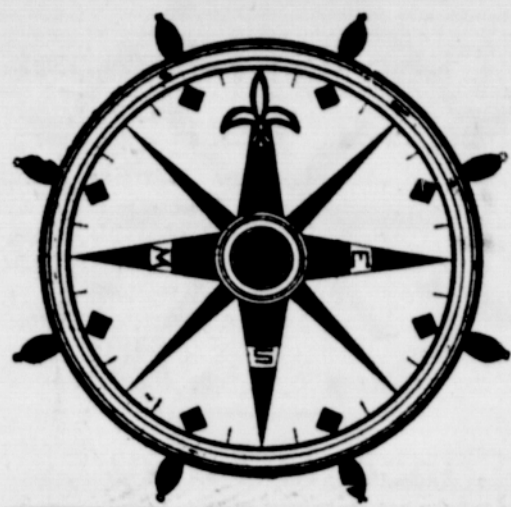




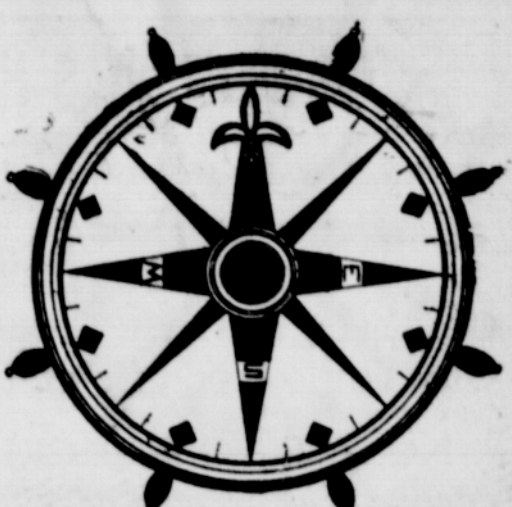

"Ore. Vacation Show" Of Interest To Tourists; S. W. Ore. Lax In Its Displays

PORTLAND—More Oregonians, particularly those from this area, will spend their vacations in the many and varied resort areas of the state during the summer.

Oregon resorts will take their wares to the metropolitan area for the second annual three-day *Oregon Vacation Show* to be held in Portland armory, April 6, 7, and 8. From last year's experience attendance is expected to pass 10,000 people.

Close to 50 resorts and resort areas are to be pre-presented, in addition to another 30 to 40 commercial exhibitors. A 40-minute stage show, on the spot broadcasts and other attractions are being arranged.

According to Jack Matlack, general show chairman, there is a fairly well-rounded representation from most parts of the state with the exception of Brookings, Gold Beach and Bandon areas. The three-day show is sponsored by the Visitors Service Department of the Portland Chamber of Commerce.

Home Ravaged By Fire last Thursday

When an electric heater was accidentally left, facing a davenport, last Thursday, fire broke out and ravaged the interior of the Charles Bickner home. A fire extinguisher stopped the fire in the room, but the upholstery of the davenport smouldered until it finally broke out, starting the fire anew.

When discovered by neighbors much of the living room, had been badly damaged, and the remainder of the home badly smoked up, ruining much of the clothes and furnishings.

The contents and home were covered by insurance, but insufficient to cover the loss. Mr. Bickner told the Pilot. However, he said he was indeed lucky that the fire never at any time had sufficient draft to burn the house down, thanks to the ball type fire extinguishers.

Warren Smith Will Head Rotary Club

At a meeting of the board of directors of Brookings Rotary Club, Warren Smith was named president for the coming year; Gordon Goetz, vice-president; L. O. Hampton, secretary and Albert Joy, sergeant-at-arms.

Some of these men will be included in the group which will attend the conference at Eugene shortly.

Dr. A. O. Schmitt reported to the club the recommended methods of survival from atomic bomb blast, as set forth in the medical journals, as part of the program:

"An atomic bomb blast is fatal up to three-fourths of a mile — and it is quite unlikely anything will survive. However, fatalities decrease rapidly at greater distance. Blasts last about 30 seconds, and give forth terrific heat, which is intense up to the distance of the blast.

"Radio-active rays penetrate to great depth, in almost every material, as almost two feet in concrete, three to four feet of earth and a foot of steel. Since the heat is the greatest factor to consider, Drop face downward, cover the eyes with arm or light colored material available. Lie there for at least a minute before stirring, and if you survive get to water and bathe in strong soapy water.

"Radio-activity becomes less as time passes. If the initial blast is not fatal, and a person takes precautions, outside of burns, no further pain may be expected.

"Bombing most likely will be at points where war materials are manufactured. Transportation lines, power plants and the like will be the main objectives. Panic, caused by bomb blasts, may cause people to flock to other areas, and thus creating new hazards. Stay where you are if you survive a blast, and do take every precaution in combating radio-activity."

He had been in the thick of action during the recent push toward Seoul, and had been captured twice but was lucky to escape.

Mr. and Mrs. Nelson have been anxiously awaiting further word since they received the Feb. 22 message stating their son was missing. Later message, March 14, told the sad news.

Sgt. Nelson attended the Fortuna high school before enlisting. He is survived by his parents, three sisters and a brother. His aged paternal grandmother lives at Fortuna, and he has other relatives at Rio Dell and in South Dakota.
