

Lily Field Day Set For Saturday P. M.

Curry County lily growers will be interested to learn of the Easter lily field day at the greenhouses at OSC, Corvallis, set for 1 p. m., Saturday, March 31, according to Clifford Jenkins, county agent.

At this time recent research work on Easter lily bulbs will be presented by research and extension men who have been working on lily problems during the past year. Latest findings of nutrition requirements for forcing lilies will be presented. Life and its proper use will be presented.

New evidence has been found which should help in the eliminating scorch from the foliage. Soils from some of Curry county planting where scorch has been a problem have been used for this work.

This meeting is being called by Ralph Clarke, horticulture specialist, and should be worth while for lily growers to attend.
