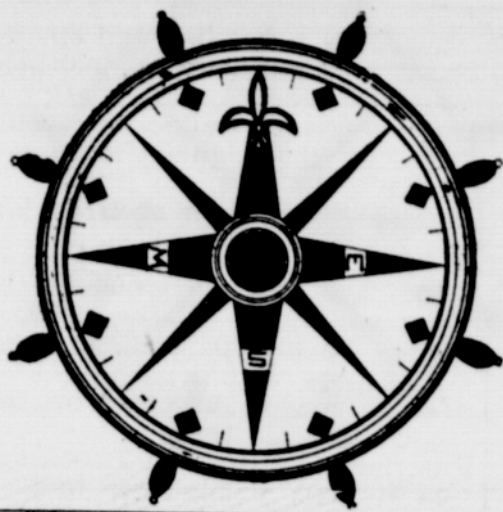
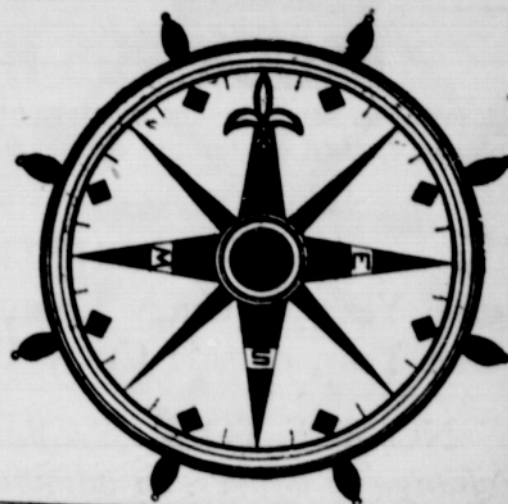

Hall Jammed At SPEBSQSA Show And Charter Nite

A packed house greeted charter night festivities of Crescent City SPEBSQSA, Saturday at the Crescent-Elk auditorium, with all seats taken long before starting time. It is said that many were turned away, being indifferent to appeal to purchase tickets beforehand.

Sponsored by the Brookings chapter, this new group was given a rousing start when top quartets came from Eugene, Medford, Sacramento and Berkeley to assist in the opening.

Two feminine groups, the high school sextette of Del Norte and "The Harmonettes" of Brookings added a touch to the show, and to indicate the interest is also spreading to women of the world as well as the men.

The Crescent City group, under direction of Henry Rudde, music teacher in the Crescent City schools, gave notice that a great deal may be expected from that chapter in the months to come. Two of their quartets had much applause for the first appearance, and predictions were plenty that these may be real competitors in time.

Probably the quartet that attracted the most attention was "The Jesters" from Sacramento, composed of four boys, oldest of which was 19, and youngest, a skinny 16-year-old bass. "The Lumberlads" of Eugene, "The McIlwaines" of Medford and "The Uncalled Four" of Berkeley were tops in the show.

Composed of about 25 voices, the Crescent City Barbershopers already have developed into quite a singing group.

At the Afterglow, held in the basement of the school, all the singing groups really "gave out" with harmony. At this time the Harmonettes of Brookings did not have full strength to perform, as was hoped.

Mrs. Bollinger developed a sore side the next day, while Mr. Bollinger had a small scratched spot on his forehead.

The car which Mr. Whirry did not see in the blinding headlights was standing with two wheels on the pavement, apparently the owners had abandoned it when it stopped running for some reason. After the impact, it rolled partially over the bank.

Nine 4-H Clubbers Will Earn Summer School Awards

Clifford Jenkins, county agent, was principal speaker at Tuesday luncheon of Brookings Rotary, club, telling of the work being done through the 4-H clubs in this county and the ultimate goal he held for them. This area, he said, had about 40 per cent of the 4-H club boys and girls of the county, and was entitled to about that percentage of summer school scholarships, of the 36 allotted to this county.

Members of the club, together with the club treasury, offered Mr. Jenkins nine scholarships, with, one from the chamber of commerce, since a number of the chamber board were present.

Albert Joy and Lynn Hampton will act in behalf of the Rotary club in the selection of winners, when that time comes.

Those helping in the cause include Warren Smith, A. P. Hendricks, Dewey Akers, Homer Kessler, Pete Lesmeister, Dr. A. O. Schmitt, Albert Joy, Gordon Goetz and Virgil Goldsberry. As the club treasury was voted for one scholarship, nine youth will be expected, with Clifford Jenkins, to stage a program for the club, some time after the summer school closes.

Jenkins told of the agricultural goals of this county, how each of many farm projects could be increased without much effort, naming sheep, lilies, and cattle.

Incorporation To Be Discussed Tonite
