A program of unusual interest is planned for the Azalea Garden Club meeting on April 12. Distinguished visitors, and a traveling collection of garden craft, as well as music to add to our enjoyment, by the Mothersingers.

Mrs. E. W. Jermack of Ashland is to be the guest of the club. She is chairman of the Siskiyou region of the Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs. She is prominent in State Federation, as well as in that of her own city, and region. Azalea Garden club is a member of the Siskiyou region.

The program of the afternoon will include songs by the Mothersingers, directed by Mrs. Lloyd Morris. It was expected at this time, to have an exhibit of Junior Gardeners bird and flower books, but this will be held over until the Flower Show at the time of the Azalea Festival.

There will be instead, a traveling garden craft exhibit sponsored by the Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs. Assembled by the Crafts Chairman, it began as a collection of pressed flowers pictures which were varied and interesting.

Encouraged by the keen interest in the demonstration, the scope of the collection was widened to include a variety of handicrafts all related in some way to agreeing activities.

There are now, more than 25 different crafts included in the display.

Many of the bright-hued, pressed flower pictures which were popular in the original exhibit are included in the current display. Among them are not only flattened flower and leaf designs but third-dimensional arrangements in which the flower appears in natural form as well as color—a method made possible by sand curing.

There are also seed pictures, and botanical specimens labeled and prepared to give them educational as well as decorative value. Herb gardeners will find a diversity of items made from their favorite plants.

In the needlework department, a study and practical garden apron catches the eye. And there is a color chart of woolen yarns suitable for needlepoint or knitting with instructions for dyeing the material with natural fruit and berry colors.

Mrs. Pallady will discuss the Oregon State wild flower law.

Hostesses for the afternoon are Mrs. Emil Edwardson, chairman; and Mrs. Grayshel.

Dist. 17 Hearing Is Set For Tuesday

In view of the fact that Brookings school Dist. No. 17, is faced with an emergency situation for the school year, 1951-1952, the rural school board has set the date for a hearing on their proposed budget for Tuesday, April 10 at 8 p. m. at the court house at Gold Beach.

With construction already begun on the new plywood plant,

the Brookings school district is faced with the problem of increased enrollment. It is anticipated that the present enrollment will be doubled, thus necessitating a double staff of teachers to conduct a double shift program in the present building facilities.

Due to the fact that the levy for operating and maintaining schools of the county in excess of the 6% limitation will be voted at a county-wide election held in May, the rural board felt that the public should be aware of the financial problems caused by the increased enrollment. In all probabilities other areas of the county will be facing a similar situation within the next year.

The hearing is an open session and the public is invited.

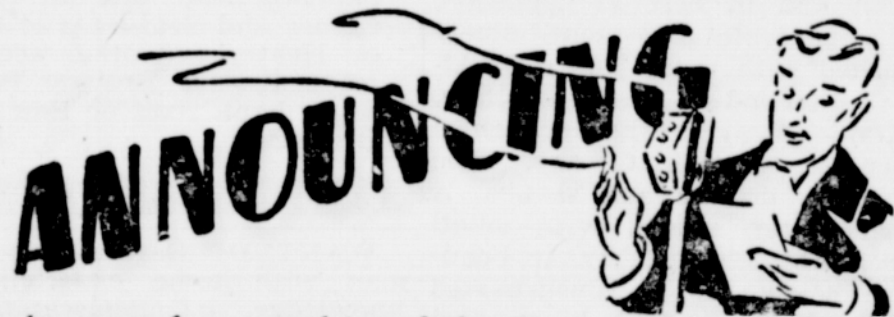
