Fish Planted In Two Local Rivers

Henry Mastin, biologist for the State Game Commission gave an interesting talk to the Chetco Rod and Gun Club, Tuesday evening.

Of particular interest to fishermen was Mr. Mastin's announcement that the game commission has released 8000 rainbow trout in the Chetco river, and also 3000 rainbows in the Winchuck. These trout, all of legal size, 9½ to 10 inches long, and 16 months old, originated at the Bandon hatchery.

Also released in the Chetco were 3000 "Silverside" salmon about eight inches in length.

Mr. Mastin stated that the commission is anxious to learn how

successful the rainbow plant will be in the local rivers and anglers are asked to report their catches to Homer Haggerty at Shell Station, or to Rex Hayes at the cannery, phone 504.
