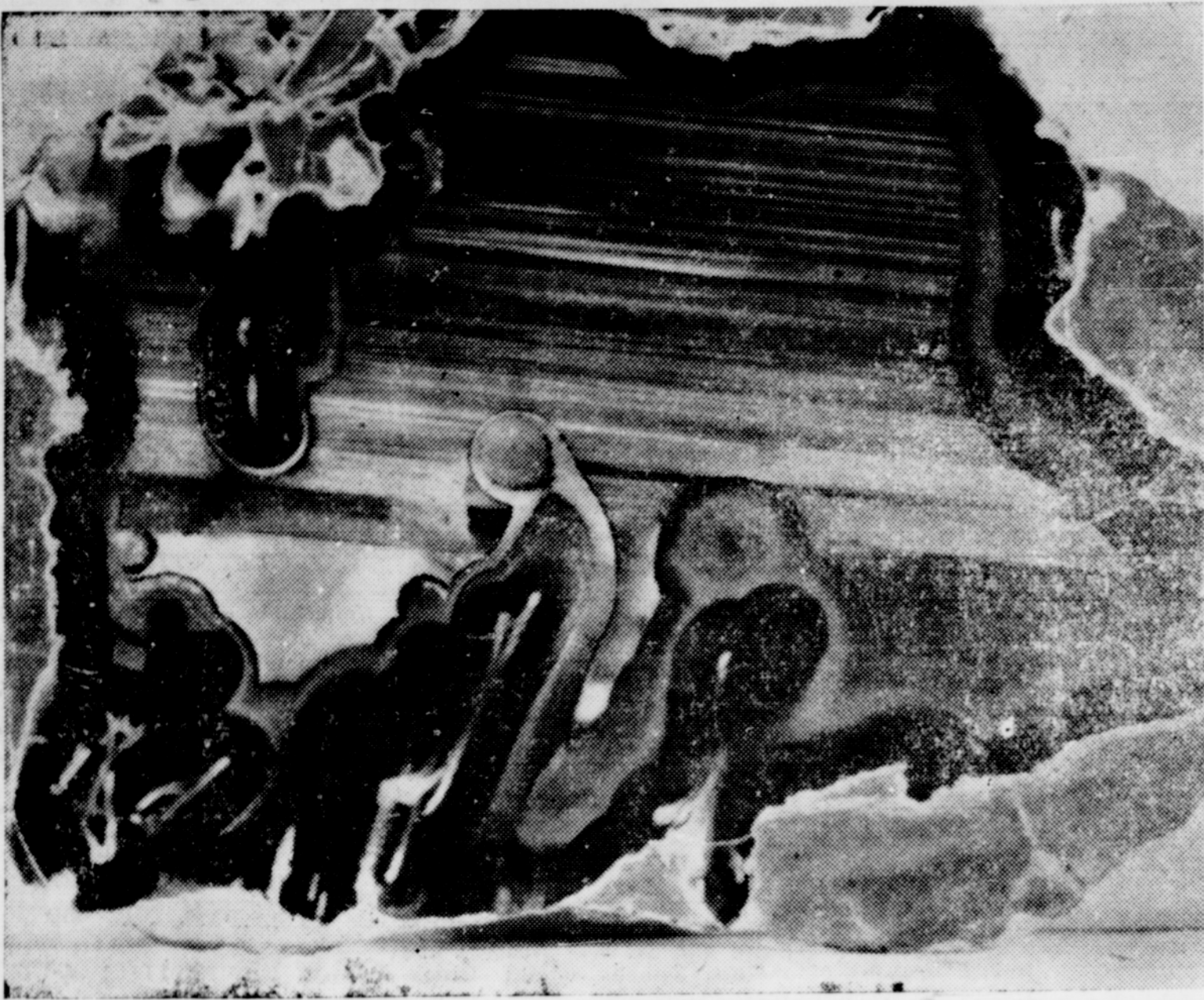


This Agate Is Reputed To Have A '\$1500 Offer' Made
