There was a great deal more involved in the firing of General MacArthur than the simple removal of a military commander by the President of the United States. The first thing to note is that the dismissal of MacArthur was a political and not a military decision. The General was dismissed (according to the president's own explanation) simply because he did not agree with the administration policies. Thus a new standard for evaluating the merit of an officer in our armed forces is established. He must agree with the policies of the president.

Although General MacArthur has carefully and accurately obeyed and carried out all orders and directives, he has never hesitated to voice disagreement on policy or to offer suggestions. He has consistently refused to be a 'yes man' even while brilliantly and successfully carrying out orders. That is the 'crime' for which he has been punished.

The dismissal of General MacArthur is one of a series of victories which have been won since 1945 by Dean Acheson and his clique in the state department. Those people dominated the Yalta conference and helped write the infamous Yalta agreements. They invented the term "agrarian reformers" to describe the Russian trained Chinese communist leaders. They were responsible for the fall of China to the communists. They were responsible for the appeasement of Russia, by allowing the 38th parallel to divide the Korean nation, thus setting the stage for the war in Korea. A few months before the Korean fighting started they were responsible for the announcement that Korea and Formosa were not within our defense interests in Asia, thus inviting communist conquest of those areas.

This state department clique headed by Acheson has openly been antagonistic to MacArthur for years. They wanted to "get him" and they did. The great value of the recent development is that it will serve to bring the whole thing out into the open. The story will be told in great detail. The people of the United States are going to have a chance to have the facts on which they can decide for themselves whether the works and ideology of the Acheson crowd represents what is best for us, or whether General MacArthur, and the rest of us who fear and oppose the Acheson operations, are right.

The day the MacArthur ouster was announced, a poll was taken of 239 House and Senate offices. A total of 8,419 telegrams and telephone calls had been received. Of that total only 47 approved the President's action. Many of the telegrams were violent expressions—5,292 even demanded

impeachment of the president. As this is written I have received more than a hundred such telegrams—all of these opposed to the action of the president.

The Selective Service — UMT bill (S 1) will be passed by the house with various amendments. This is not final action on this legislation although it has already been passed by the Senate. The bill will, in fact, be finally revised and written by the Senate-House conference committee.
