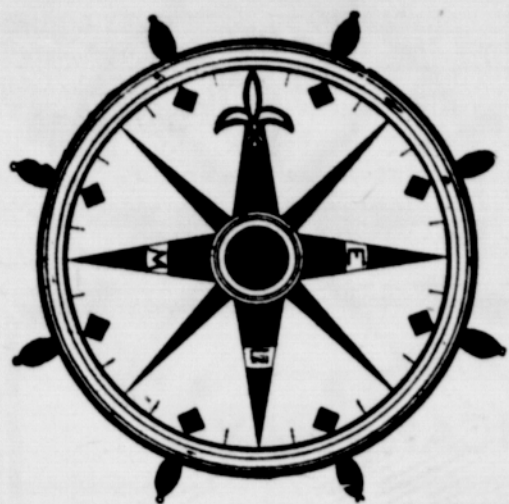
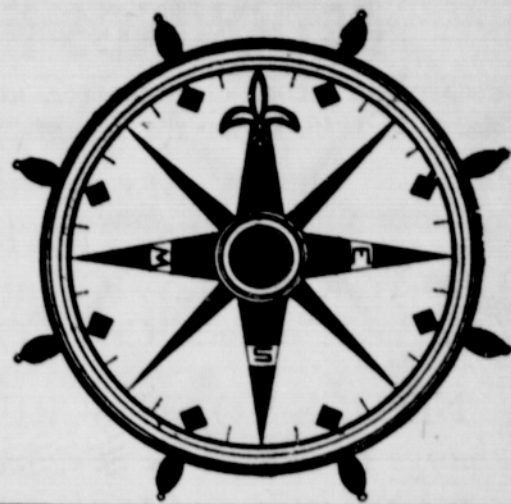

Tried Four Years Ago.

Attempt was made by Glenn Titus of Coos Bay, in 1947, to institute an aerie here, but at that time a hundred members was needed to start an aerie. Also at that time there were not enough people interested in the founding of an aerie. Since then the number was reduced to 50 members, which prompted the recent successful attempt.

New Petition Must Be Circulated Here

Insufficient names, together with too little money guarantee for an election, was reason given the committee seeking date for election on incorporation for the town of Brookings, at the Wednesday meeting of the county court.

Probably too hurriedly done, the petitions presented to the county court did not contain sufficient names of legal voters, according to a check made. In addition, \$250 was said to be needed to conduct the election, once the date has been set.

The incorporation committee, after being informed of the lack, met last Thursday night, to rewrite and re-circulate the petitions. Adequate money has now been raised.

The petitions, as presented, did not have a notary seal to insure their validity to the county court, due to the hurried preparation and apparent lack of legal advice in the matter.

Presentation, therefore, will be delayed one month.

Brookings Dump Is "Handier"

Smith River's garbage disposal problems have been solved and 54 families and business places are utilizing the new Brookings Garbage service, it was learned this week.

The garbage problem was started when August Holtorf, former collector, notified his customers that he could not afford to continue collection of refuse for delivery to the Crescent City garbage dump, a 28-mile round trip.

Del Norte county subsidizes the Brookings service and provides \$25 toward the truck maintenance. Garbage is dumped on the land of the owner on the Chetco River.—Del Norte Triplicate, May 4, 1951.

NEW HEARING IS SET FOR ROGUE

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors has called for another hearing concerning improvement of the Rogue River mouth at Gold Beach, according to notices sent out to the press and other interested people. The date set for this hearing is June 5, 1951, at Room 1031, Building T-7, Gravelly Point, Va., located on the south bank of the Potomac, just across from Washington, D. C.

All parties interested are invited to report or send representation for the hearing. Written statements may be handed to the board at the meeting or may be mailed to it beforehand. All written statements will be made part of the record and oral summary or reference thereto need not be made at the hearing.

If interested persons desire additional detailed information for the preparation of their statement to the board, they will be afforded full opportunity to examine copies of the report at the following offices: Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors, 119 D Street, N. E., Washington, 25, D. C.; Division Engineer, North Pacific Division, 500 Pittock Block, S. W. 10th, and Washington, Portland; and District Engineer, Portland District, 628 Pittock Block. Copies of the report will not be loaned for use outside the designated offices but interested parties, including the press, will be permitted to make such notes of the contents as they desire.
