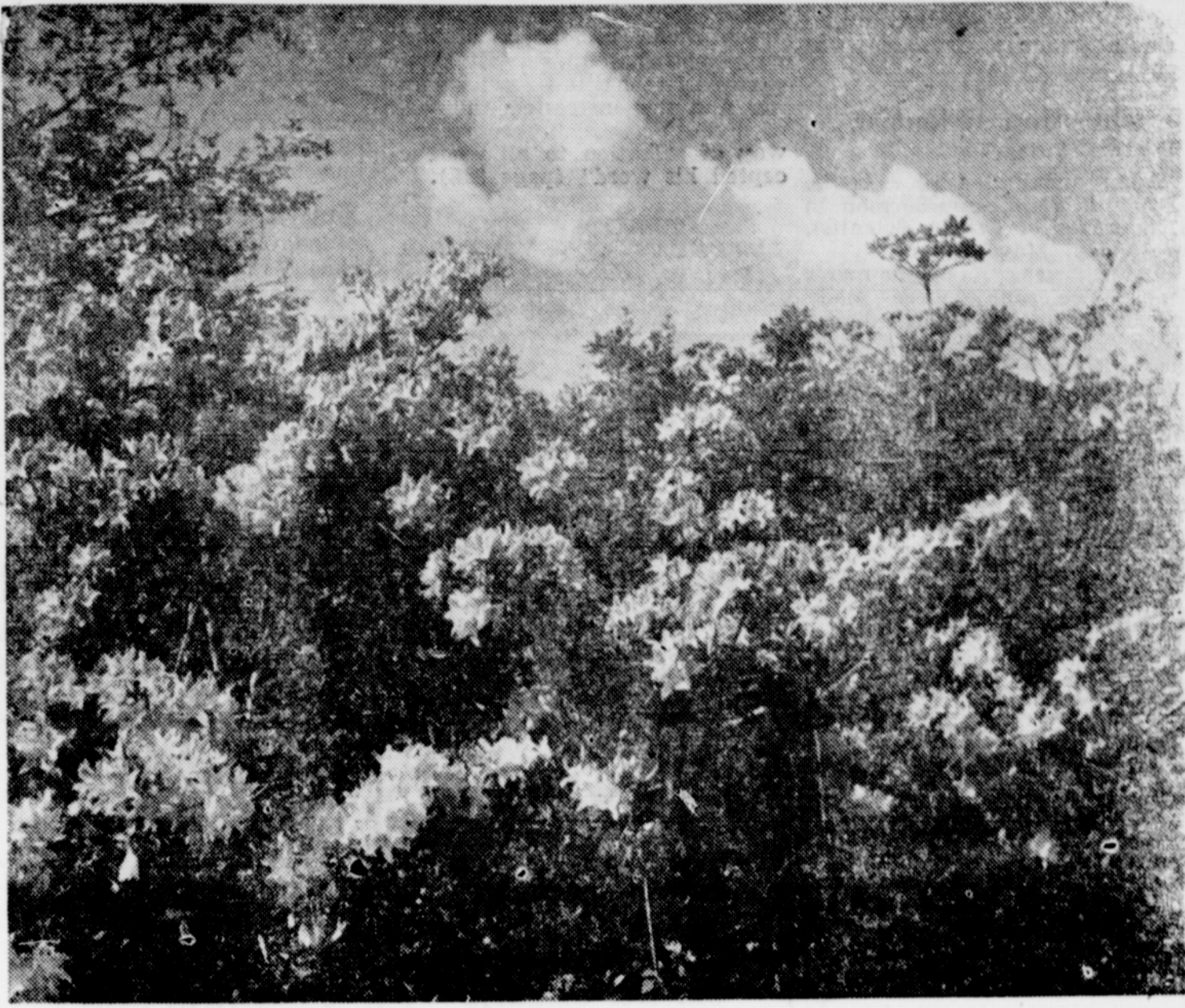


Greater Beauty Man Has Never "Seen" Anywhere Else
