Administration forces won a doubtful victory when they succeeded in having the MacArthur hearings conducted in secret. Rumors, gossip and "leaks" always do more damage than the straight cold truth. The imposed secrecy is an attempted "cover up" but in the long pull nothing will actually be covered. The only possible result of the secrecy effort will be to further destroy public confidence in our government officials.

It received the roughest treatment yet given an appropriations bill although the total savings were not very large.
