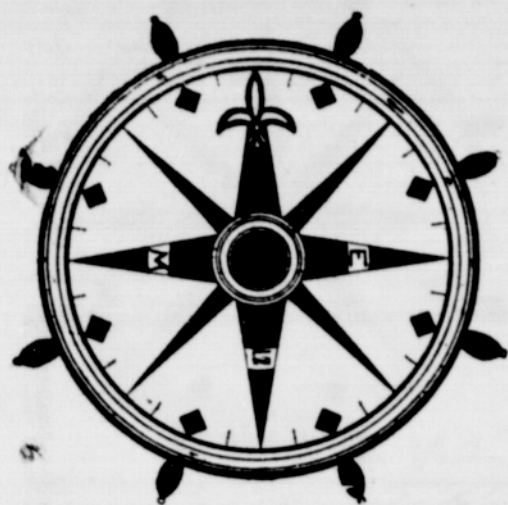
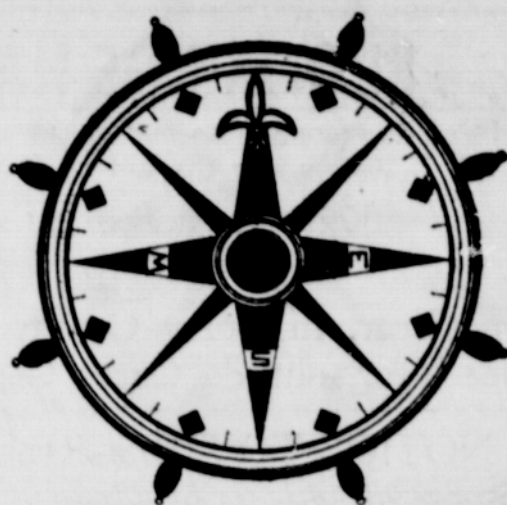

Co. Will Vote, Mon. For School Funds

Polls will open at 7:00 p. m. in all elementary school districts of Curry county, Monday, May 21, to vote on the question of exceeding the 6% limitation for the 1951-52 school year in the amount of \$109,356.37. Check the posted notice in your district concerning the building where the election will be held. (In the local district, high school gym).

The Rural School Board audited all budgets according to an adopted policy schedule allowing each school district a specific amount on each budget item.

Some items were audited on a per-pupil basis; some on per-teacher basis; and other items on a per-room basis. The Rural School Board included in its policy schedule amounts which the board felt would allow for adequate operational expenses for all schools.

There has been a steady increase in enrollment in Curry county schools and an even bigger increase is expected for the 1951-52 school year. However, the amount in excess of the 6% limitation for the next fiscal year is \$109,356.37, and is a lesser amount than was needed in the 1949-50 budget when amount in excess of the 6% limitation was \$124,179.27 and was voted favorably.

The total estimated expenditures for all Curry county school districts as audited and allowed by the Rural School Board was \$459,689.13. Of this amount \$201,521.78 is offset by estimated receipts leaving \$258,167.35 to be raised by an equalized tax in Curry county. The tax base for the Rural School District is \$148,810.98, leaving the balance remaining in excess of the 6% limitation in the amount of \$109,356.37, to be voted at the May 21 election.

All registered voters, residents of the district for six months prior to election are entitled to vote. (Registration must be before April 21)

Pomona Grange has gone on record, it is reported as favoring support and passage of the 6% limitation vote.
