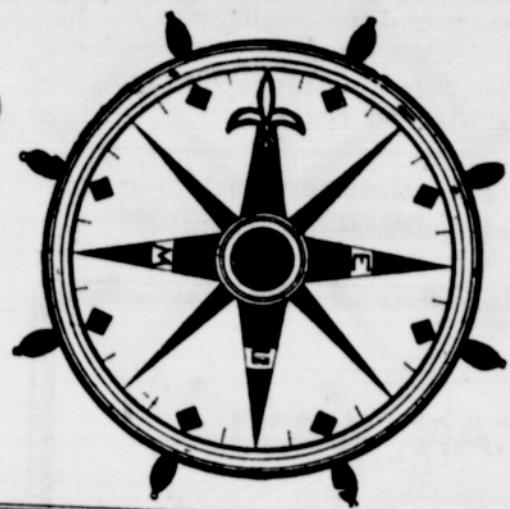
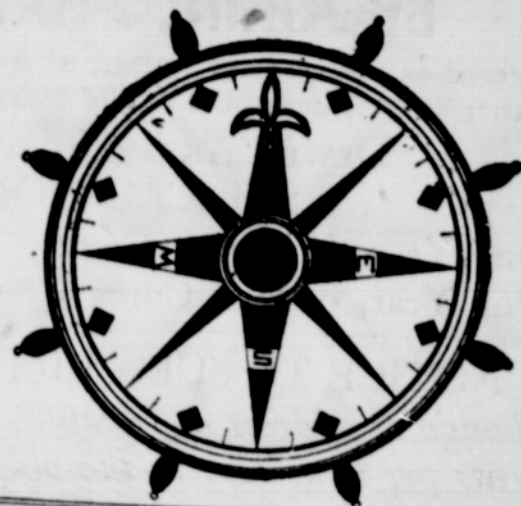

Accident Fatal To Clifford Sisk, Sat.

Clifford Sisk, timekeeper and job foreman for Parker-Schram, general road contractors on the Highway 101 south of Harbor, was fatally injured just a little before eight a. m. last Saturday while acting as flagman near the REA substation, close to Azalea State Park.

Sisk, the Pilot was told, was watching the approaching 'carry-all' and was unaware of the presence of a bulldozer, backing up, and the dozer skinner was unaware of Sisk's closeness. The track rolled over Sisk's body diagonally from his left hip and toward his right knee, crushing both legs horribly.

Rushed to Seaside hospital by ambulance, he was immediately put in surgery, where blood transfusions and medical skill could do nothing to bring him out of shock. Sisk expired about 2:30 p. m. after being conscious much of the time following the accident.

Had Planned to Live Here

An accountant by profession, Sisk had laid plans to open up an office for bookkeeping and accounting service in the Central building, and planned to start that work as soon as the highway job was completed. The family had even planned to buy a home here.

Shipped To Lewiston, Ida.

Mrs. Sisk and her daughter, Shirley, left Tuesday for Lewiston, Idaho, where last rites will be held, and burial will be in the family plot near there.

Mrs. Sisk and daughter plan to return here, a place the family came to love, to make their home. Mrs. Sisk, once a high school teacher, plans to re-enter that profession, and her daughter, a sophomore in high school, will attend school here serve on an apprenticeship at the Pilot and later attend University of Oregon journalism school.

A son, in the aviation service, arrived from camp, Monday, to accompany his mother and sister to Lewiston for the burial.

Born July 23, 1906, Mr. Sisk married Jessie Gregson at Orofino, Idaho, June 23, 1929. Besides his widow, a son, daughter and a few half brothers survive.
