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**Journal Artists At
Local Flower Show**

Staff artists of the Oregon Journal exhibited original drawings of cartoons recently appearing in that newspaper at the Azalea Garden Club Flower and Art Show, Saturday, and Sunday.

Even those late date which the request came in to the Journal office must have made it difficult to do so, Miss Louise Aaron, art editor of the Journal, arranged the collection of black and whites and stated that the Journal was only too happy to co-operate in such an undertaking.

This is the first time Portland artists have been represented in a cartoon exhibit here. Favorably received by the public, it is to be hoped that it will prove the beginning of art shows larger in scope in the future.

These Journal artists exhibited here:

Howard Fisher, who has been an editorial artist on the Journal since 1919. Born at Santa Fe, New Mexico, he studied engineering but left that profession for the Museum Art school. His hobby is wood carving, an activity which gives him opportunity to create in three dimensional form.

George Hoerner is an artist for the Pacific Parade Magazine section, his pictures appearing on the cover and also in the paper's garden section. He likes to work with oils but is better known as a water colorist. He served in the last war.

John Waddingham heads the Journal's promotion art staff. Serving in World War 2, he returned to this country and was employed by the West Coast Picture Corporation before going to the Journal.

Bob Fassett, head, the news department art staff. He studied at the Museum Art School, has worked as an engineering draftsman at maritime shipyards on Swan Island. Off the job he is a water colorist.

Carl Bonelli worked as an artist for a number of years on the Fresno Bee and the Sacramento Bee in California and as a freelance artist. He served 24 months as a marine seargent in the Pacific. He is best known for his newspaper drawings and cartoons of people and sports events.

All the Journal staff artists are well known in art circles, and all have exhibited in art museums and shows throughout the west. The community here was fortunate in obtaining such an exhibit.

Azalea Garden Club Art show had as well as the cartoon collection, exhibits by well-loved and often seen artists who have exhibited with the club in past years.

Sidney Armer's flower pictures, Pernot Duff's seascapes and coast water colors, Katherine Hardesty who has a following in local circles was represented by an oil, a still-life owned by Mr. and Mrs. Dan Massett. Carl Dam, well known here, both as an artist and teacher, was represented by the work of one of his talented pupils, David Langfelt. A new artist exhibiting was M. Power Starks of Crescent City, self-taught, who entered pastels and oil land and seascapes

at the show.
