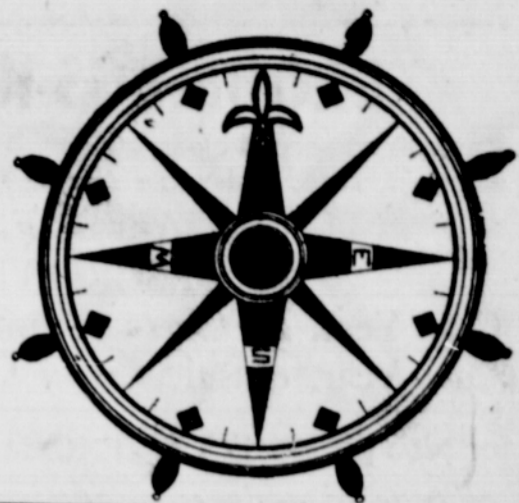

John W. Mosier Passes, Thursday, At Age of 86 Yrs.

After being in failing health for approximately a year, John W. Mosier, 86, died at his home here last Thursday afternoon. He recently had returned from the Seaside Hospital, where he was confined several days, with hope on his part "that if he were at home, all would be well."

Born in Ringold County, Ia., May 25, 1865, he was married in 1892 to Emma Lee Muhn, to which union were born six children, two of who preceded him in death.

Surviving, in addition to his widow, are: Mrs. D. W. Longacre, Brookings; A. A. Mosier of Newport, Oreg.; Vera B. McNamara of Hollywood who had spent much of the past year here in care of her father; Lloyd Mosier of Richmond, Calif.

Under direction of Roeder Funeral home, Crescent City, the body was shipped to Nebraska, Tuesday for burial.

Mr. and Mrs. Mosier moved to Brookings in 1919 from Ashland, and have been continual residents of this place. He owned property here and in Nebraska.

The mother of the groom was attired in a navy gabardine suit with pink accessories and a corsage of pink carnations.

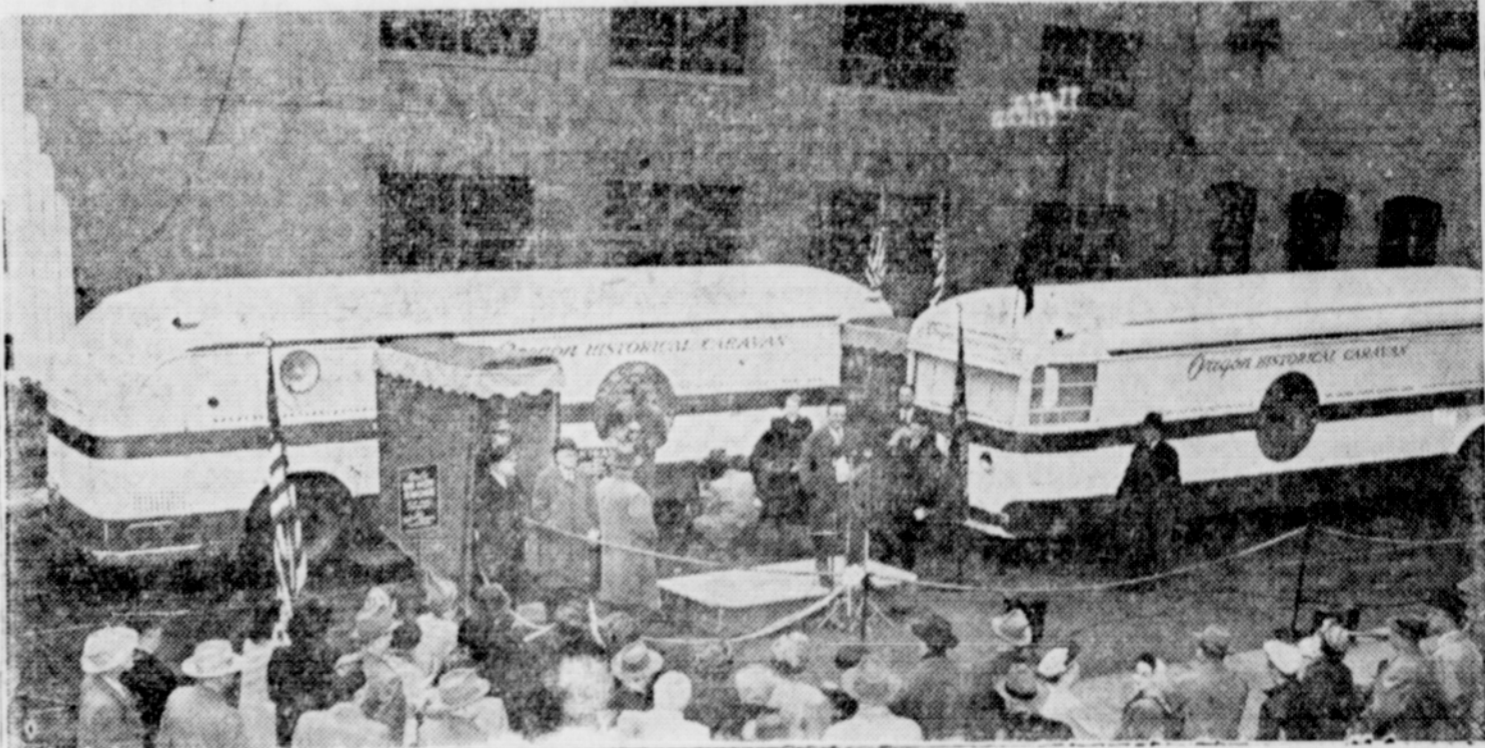
