

National Timber For Sale

Sealed bids will be received by the Forest Supervisor, Post Office Building, Grants Pass, Oregon, up to and not later than 2:00 P. M., Pacific Daylight Saving time, July 20, 1951, for all mercantable dead timber standing or down located on an area embracing approximately 200 acres within Sections 6 and 7, T. 39 S., R. 12 W., W. M. and lying on Northern Prairie Creek within the Chetco River watershed, Siskiyou National Forest, Oregon, estimated to be 1,500,000 board feet, more or less, of Douglas-fir and other species of saw-timber. All standing dead timber within the sale boundaries will be considered as marked for cutting and the sale contract will require that all such dead timber be felled. No bid of less than \$1,650.00 for the total volume of timber as estimated above will be considered. In addition to the price bid for stumpage a deposit of \$750.00 to be used by the Forest Service for paying the cost of slash disposal and an additional co-operative deposit of \$1,250. to cover the cost of tree planting, seed sowing, and timber stand improvement work on the area cut over will be required. \$3,250.00 must accompany each bid to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages according to the conditions of sale. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, That on the 10th day of July, 1951, at Brookings, in the Brookings Precinct, Curry County, Oregon, an election will be held at eight o'clock in the morning and will continue until eight o'clock in the afternoon of said day for the purpose of submitting the following proposition to the legal voters residing within the boundaries described in the proposition.

A City to be known as the City of Brookings shall be incorporated within boundaries as follows:
