

PELICANS BLASTED, 15-3, SUNDAY; EIGHT PEL ERRORS HELP SCORING

Brookings Pelicans wondered, Sunday, what hit them, when the Coos Bay-North Bend Lumberjacks blasted out a 15-3 score over their heads at the local field. The Pelicans, usually stable behind their pitcher, bobbled the ball eight times, permitting at least half of the tallies made by the visitors.

In the first inning the visitors blasted a home run to break the scoring open for the deluge which was to come. Blanked in the second, the Lumberjacks put together three hits for two runs in the third, and at that moment there appeared to be a baseball game of the fans liking.

In the fourth, when two errors put Bob Astin in the hole, the visitors suddenly found their batting eyes to collect six hits and six runs, from which treatment, Brookings could find no pitcher to cope with the situation as all received the same kind of reception. Nierman pitched one inning, and two errors put him in the hole, and two hits added another four runs.

After Nierman was able to put the fire out in the fifth, he went back to his position at first and Keith Johnson took up the chucking chores. He was touched for five runs before Hank Westbrook took up the hopeless task in the eighth.

With almost an entirely new team on the field, only one run was scored from him, as he was able to blank the visitors in the ninth inning.

On the other hand, the Pelicans could do little with Fredrick's delivery, although twice they loaded the bases, until the ninth when Peterson singled, scored on Astin's triple; Kimura walked, stole second and both came in on McLean's single.
