Since school closed this spring some 25 windows in the school buildings have been broken, approximately half by rocks, and the remainder by "B-B's"

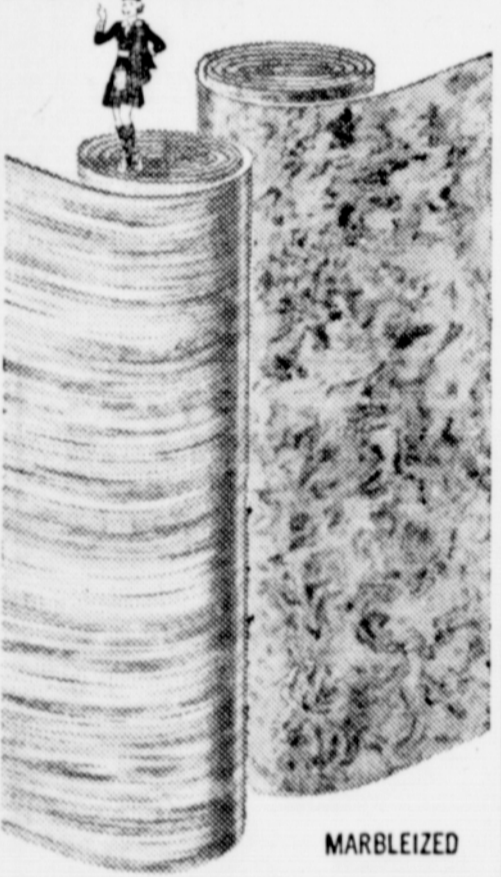
Both materials and labor for replacement of these windows run into quite an expense, at the best, unnecessary expense.
