

PELICANS BOUNCE BACK, SUNDAY, TO DOWN REEDSPORT NINE, 12 TO 0

After being kicked around in the three previous games, the Brookings Pelicans, Sunday, rose up in full might to swat down the Reedsport nine, 12 to 0 in a slug-fest which marked the Pelicans coming out of their batting slump of the last few games. Behind the three-hit pitching of Don Clausen and Bob Astin, the visitors were rudely handled.

The slaughter started in the first inning which saw the visitors load the bases and then fail to score. Kimura singled, came in when McLean hit for four bases: Matson walked and Astin, Selsor and Nierman each singled to drive in three more runs.

Matson doubled in the second and was sent home by Astin's four-ply smash, to add a brace of runs to what would turn out to be another high-scoring game for the Pelicans. Peterson hit for two bases in the third, and came in on Clausen's single.

In the fourth, the Pelicans had their first blank inning, but Polando reached first on an error in the fifth, went to second on another error and came in on Clausen's single. In the sixth Matson reached second on the third baseman's error, advanced on an infield out and scored on Selsor's long fly to right.

The seventh saw Johnson given a pass, and score on Kimura's hit for four bases. This wound up the scoring for the run-hungry Pelicans.

Reedsport, vanquishers of the Roseburg team the Sunday before, was able to get but one infield hit off Clausen, and but one line single off Astin in the ninth, which came nearest resembling a hit. Reedsport got a slow infield hit in the eighth.
