**Motor Vehicle Law Emphatic, Says Sec. of State**

SALEM—A sharp warning to persons who are driving automobiles in this state without a legal operator's license, or none at all, that Oregon's new motor vehicle safety responsibility law will deal harshly with them was issued by Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry.

Secretary Newbry estimated that as many as 100,000 unlicensed drivers are operating automobiles at the present time. Many of them, he said, probably are young drivers who take over the wheel of the family car, not realizing the serious chances they are taking both with the state driver licensing law and the safety responsibility law, which becomes effective August 2. Others, he added, are wilful law violators who deserve severe punishment.

"It is going to be very difficult for unlicensed drivers to evade detection for very long," Newbry declared. "When they are caught, as I am sure they will be sooner or later, the safety responsibility law will not deal lightly with them. It may be very difficult for them ever to own or operate a motor vehicle. At best, it will prove extremely costly. Here is exactly what the new law provides in such cases:

"If a person has no license, but by final order or judgment is convicted of or forfeits any bail or collateral deposited to secure an appearance for trial for any offense requiring the suspension or revocation of license, or for driving a motor vehicle upon the highways without being licensed to do so, or for driving an unregistered vehicle upon the highways; no license shall be thereafter issued to such person and no such vehicle shall continue to be registered or thereafter be registered in the name of such person as owner unless he shall give and thereafter maintain for a period of three years proof of financial responsibility."
