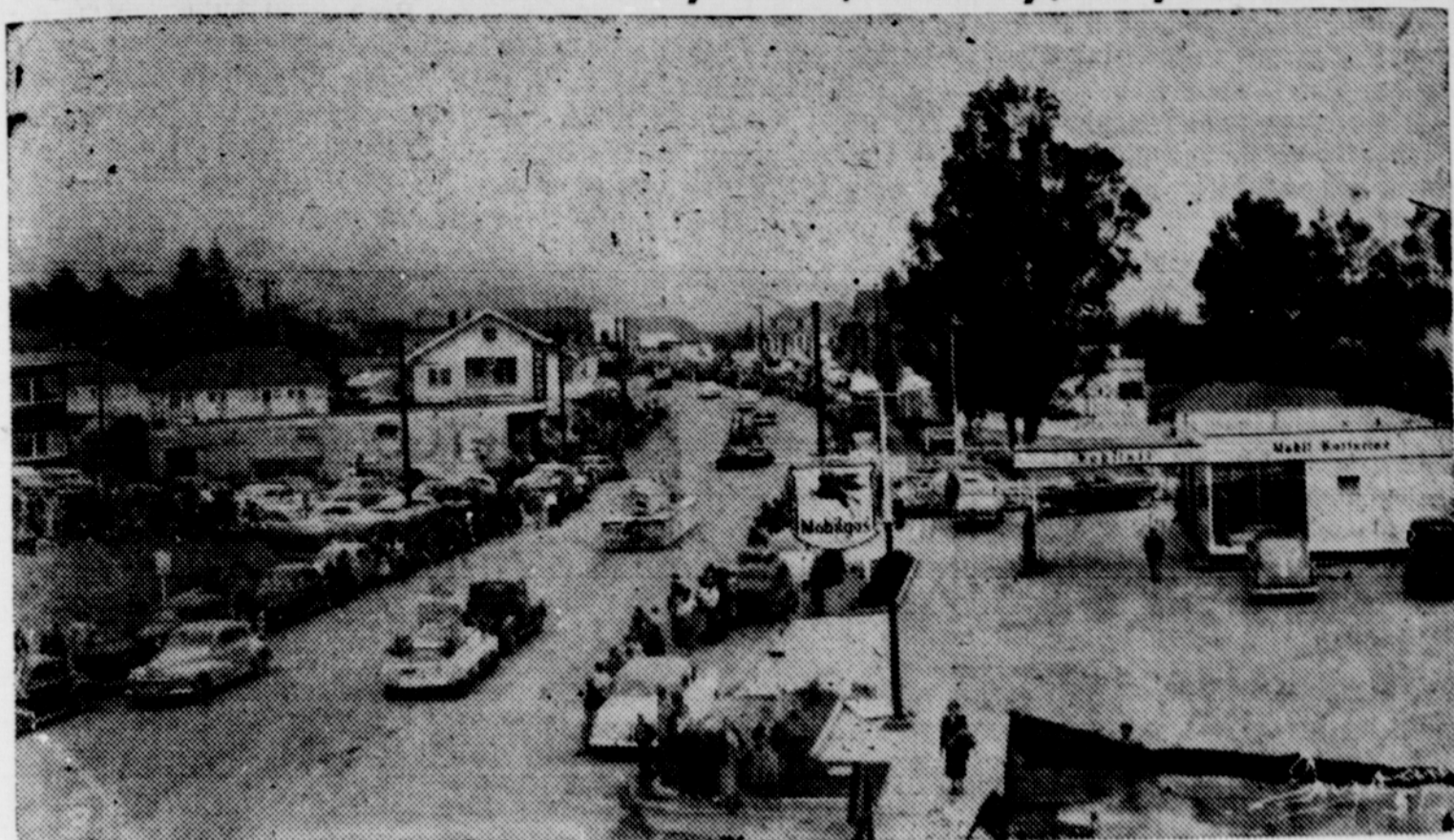
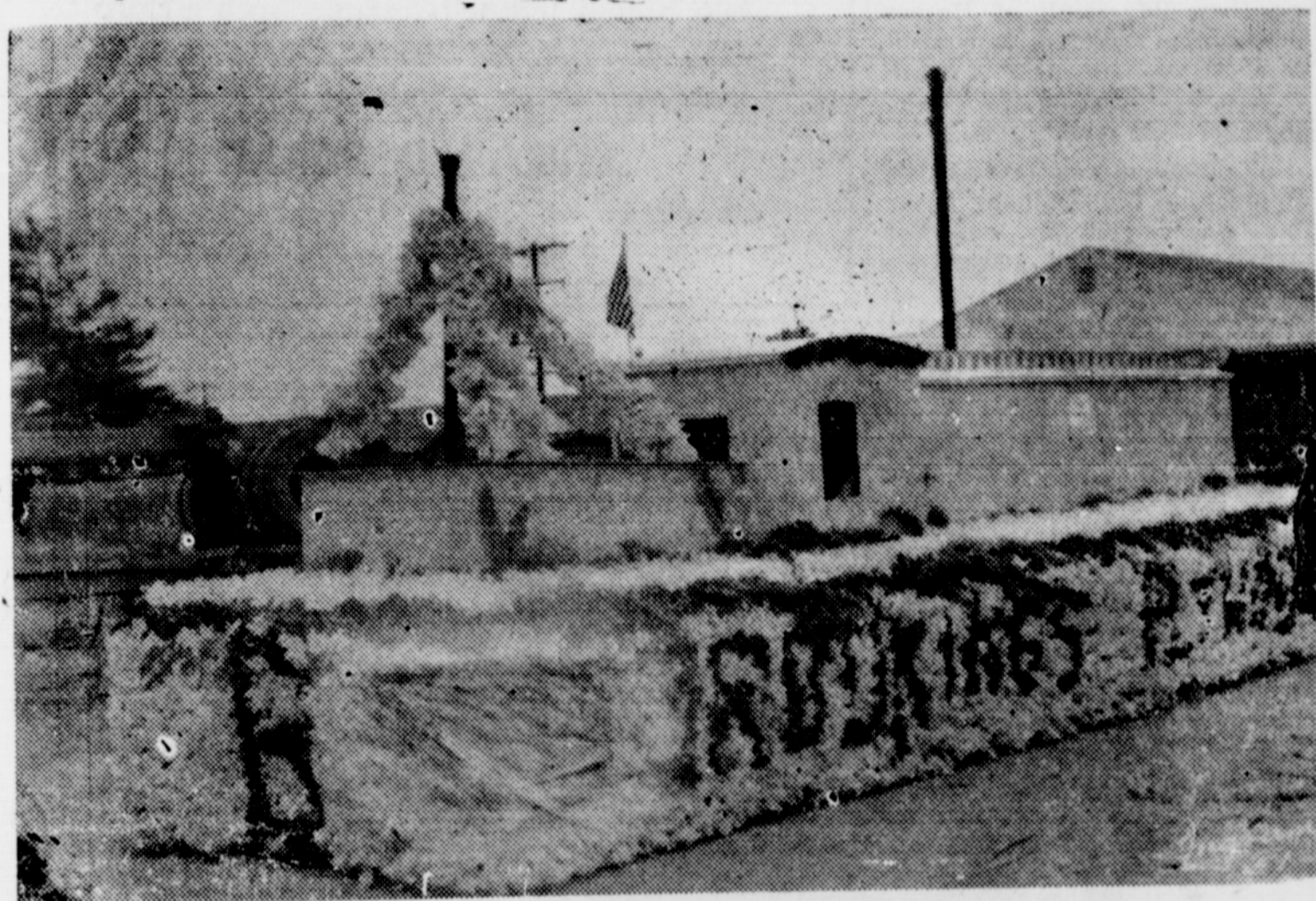


The Parade Get Under Way Here, Sunday, July 8 at 1:30

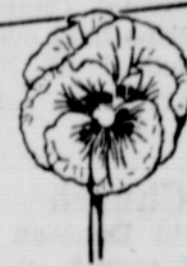
